Then the player hums with the mouth closed.

CALIFORNIA NEWS

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 12.—Election of members of the state railroad commission, rather than their appointment by the governor, as at present, is called for in a bill to be presented by Assemblyman George Hume, of Ventura. Hume is the second representative from the south to attack the railroad commission, which they charge with being entirely too friendly with the corporations.

CHICO, Jan. 12.—Plans to reduce the cost of home building in Chico in the hope thereby of inspiring a revival of construction were formed when held here. The Chico Home Building association was organized and contracting and material costs 15 per cent lower than the present were pledged.

OROVILLE, Jan. 12.—A fractured skull, caused by a rock thrown by a playmate, resulted in the death of Homer Winston Stephenson, 10, a son of Mr. and Mrs. V. E. Stephenson of this city.

MARYSVILLE, Jan. 12.—The new grand jury of Yuba county under the foremanship of Roger L. Alderman, stock raiser of Waldo, will go the extreme limit to uncover alleged immoral conditions in Marysville according to a statement issued by Alderman. He says he will give the local officers every opportunity to put the lid on the gambling dens and if they fail the grand jury will act.

STOCKTON, Jan. 12.—Called to the Coffee club to clean out a drain pipe, workmen found that jewelry and other articles had clogged the pipe. It is supposed that a burglar, failing to dispose of his loot, threw it into the drain.

OROVILLE, Jan. 12.—A coyote drive will take place in Thermalito within the near future. This is the decision made at a meeting of the Thermalito farm center.

DAVIS, Jan. 12.—Voting approval of the emergency tariff bill now before congress and other questions of vital interest to the wood men of the state were discussed by the California Wool Growers' association at the 14th annual meeting here Saturday.

WOODLAND, Jan. 12.—Samuel S. Deane, one of the best known real-

dents of Woodland and Yolo county, died suddenly here. His body was found in the yard of the family home by his daughter.

LODI, Jan. 12.—Mrs. Mary L. Walker met death at her home near Burson, Calaveras county, when she fell into an icy spring and died from the shock a few minutes after being rescued by her husband.

WOODLAND, Jan. 12.—Angelo Bacchini appeared before Justice of the Peace R. W. Harrison with his attorney, Charles W. Thomas, and pleaded guilty to a charge of bootlegging made against him by District Attorney C. C. McDonald and was fined \$500, which he paid.

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 12.—Encouraged by their success during the past season, when wine grapes brought as high as \$350 a ton, growers in many of the districts are preparing to double their production next year, according to reports received from local fruit men.

Old Hairdress Revived



There is a new style of hair-dressing reminiscent of the coquettish "Waterfall" of the 1870's. Miss Vivian Martyn, pretty screen star, originated it. "I began," Miss Martyn directs, "by parting it through the center. Then I part it the other way down just in front of my ears, then still again just crosswise just above my ears. This makes three sections of hair.
