**Three Million Folk Enjoy Chicago Park**

CHICAGO, Jan. 13.—In its fifth year Chicago's forest preserve, encircling the city in a great outer park belt, numbers 18,028 acres and cost \$7,220,000, Peter Reinberg, president of the district, reports. In 1920 the preserve entertained over 3,000,000 people.

The park already includes more than half of the 30,000 acres of available wooded land behind Chicago and new tracts are continually being added.

Indian day held in the preserve last year, commemorating tribes that once lived in these same wooded lands, proved so successful that it will be made an annual event. Descendants of these tribes were brought back for the affair.

**RESOLUTION DECLARING INTENTION TO MAKE STREET IMPROVEMENTS**

The city engineer pursuant to resolution of the Common Council of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, having under date of December 11th, 1920, filed his plans, specifications and estimates of costs of improving Fourth street from southerly line of Klamath avenue to the southerly line of Oak avenue; Fifth street from the southerly line of Klamath avenue to the southerly line of Willow avenue; Walnut avenue from the northerly line of Fourth street to the southerly line of Seventh street and Willow avenue from the northerly line of Fifth street to the southerly line of Sixth street, together with all intersections between the termini mentioned not already improved; Such improvement to consist in bringing said portions of said street to the established grade, and hard surfacing the same with Bitulithic, pavement to the following widths:

Fourth street from Klamath to Oak the hard surfacing to be 25 feet in width; with four foot cement sidewalks on each side of the street so far as improved.

Fifth street from Klamath avenue to Walnut avenue the hard surfacing to be 40 feet in width; and from the southerly line of Walnut avenue to the northerly line of Willow avenue the hard surfacing to be 32 feet in width with cement sidewalks on each side of said Fifth street from Klamath avenue to be the northerly line of Oak avenue.

Willow avenue from Fifth street to Sixth street the hard surfacing to be 32 feet in width; no sidewalks.

Walnut avenue from Fourth street to Sixth street the hard surfacing to be 25 feet in width.

Oak avenue from Fourth street to Seventh street the hard surfacing to be 25 feet in width with cement sidewalks on each side of said street.

The sidewalk to be installed four feet in width, together with proper and adequate drainage and curbing. It is hereby resolved, that said plans, specifications, and estimates of cost for making the improvements above described, be and the same are hereby approved.

And be it further resolved, that the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve said portions of said streets and avenues in accordance with said plans and specifications and estimates of cost in the manner and form above mentioned with Bitulithic or other hard surface pavement. The estimated cost of the proposed improvements hard surfacing with Bitulithic is \$63,000.00; The estimated cost of the proposed improvements using Oil Macadam pavement is \$46,100.00; the estimated cost of the proposed improvements, hard surfacing with Concrete is \$57,800.

And be it further resolved by the Common Council that the following described property be and is hereby declared to be benefited by the making of said improvements, to-wit:

Lots 1, 2, 9, 10, and easterly half of Lots 3 and 8 Blk. 74; Lots 1, 2, 9, 10, and easterly half of Lots 3 and 8 Blk. 86; Lots 1, 2, and easterly half of Lot 3 of Blk. 91; All of Blocks 75, 85, and Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 9, 10, and easterly half of Lot 8, Blk. 92; Lots 1, 2, 9, 10, and easterly half of Lots 3 and 8 Blk. 98; Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, and westerly half of Lot 3 Blk. 75; All Block 84; Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and westerly half of Lot 8, Blk. 93; Lots 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 and westerly half of Lot 3, Blk. 97; Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, Blk. 104; Lots 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, Blk. 83; Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, Blk. 94; All of said lots and blocks above described being in Klamath addition to the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, and said above listed lots and blocks is hereby declared to be the property to be assessed for the cost of making said improvements.

And be it further resolved, that Monday, the 7th day of February, 1921, at the hour of 8 o'clock P. M. at the Council Chamber in the city hall in said city be and hereby is fixed at the time and place for the hearing of objections and remonstrances against the making of said proposed improvement, and the Police Judge is hereby directed to cause notice of said hearing by publishing this resolution as by charter required.

**Chance Overlooked By Bank Bandits**

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Jan. 13.—More than \$80,000,000 in gold, silver and currency was hauled through the streets of St. Louis without the loss of a cent, while crime here was at its peak last month, it is announced at the federal building.

Daily for nearly a month millions of dollars were carried 15 blocks to the Union station, as much as \$5,000,000 being in a single trip.

Three men, with arms concealed, guarded each vehicle, and unbroken secrecy was maintained.

The money was being sent to the mints at Denver and San Francisco from the United States treasury here, which was suspended by act of congress last May.
