

We expect the bank to open and do business as usual. Investigation shows that at no time was it insolvent. The stories of bad loans are pure fabrications. We know that recent examination of its securities disclosed nothing out of the ordin ary. Thoughtless and designing persons are making statements that had better be left unsaid, for they are going to be subjected to the searchlight of publicity if they are continued.

The president of the bank, Captain Siemens, will be home tonight and will, no doubt, within a day or two have a statement to make that will clarify the situation and put the public in possession of all the facts they are entitled to know.

There is nothing to fear. Every depositor will be paid dollar for dollar. A little patience and the same degree of common sense will have to be exercised for a short time and then there will be a clearing of the difficulties and things will go on as usual.

No developments were ported today in connection with the a pure example of faith on the part 2500 years ago, when it was made of closing of the First State & Savings bank yesterday on orders of the state superintendent of banking. Marshall Hooper, assistant state superintendent, said that an examination of the bank's records is under way, but the investigation may take several weeks to complete. In the meantime there is no information other than already given in the notice posted on the bank doors-"There is every indication that this bank is solvent."

Rumors are rife on every hand. as usual in such situations, but they add nothing to the story. Levelheaded business men, depositors of the institution, are apparently not worrying. There is general confidence that the bank will reorganize and reopen.

Capt. J. W. Siemens, president of the bank is expected to return tonight from Portland.

The situation contains many unique features. Primarily, it is an extraordinary thing to close the doors of a solvent bank to protect its loyal depositors from the result of a shaken confidence on the part of the timid minority who participated in the run that lowered the reserves to the danger point.



mittee appointed at the close of the 1919 session, will be placed before the present legislature, according to Senator Jones of San Jose.

The plan is to create a state department of education that would include all education institutions, from the state university to the elementary schools, and would take over educational functions now performed by various state agencies. Senator Jones said the committee's recommendations were in harmony with plans for complete reorganization of the state government along lines of efficiency and economy.

A state board of education would have supervision of all educational matters and the superintendent of public instruction would be made an appointive officer, Similar action is contemplated in counties, the county superintendent of schools being appointed rather than elected

While the University of California's board of regents would come into the department, according to Senator Jones, its functions would not be disturbed

The plan contemplates valsing of state normal schools to the status of colleges for teacher training so that the standard of teachers for elementary schools may be made higher. Regional junior colleges would be set up through the proposed system, thus relieving congestion at the University of California's central instiution at Berkeley. Even if the junior college plan is put into effect. Senator Jones estimates that the university will have the sume aumber of students, 10,000, in the two upper classes that it now has in four class-05
