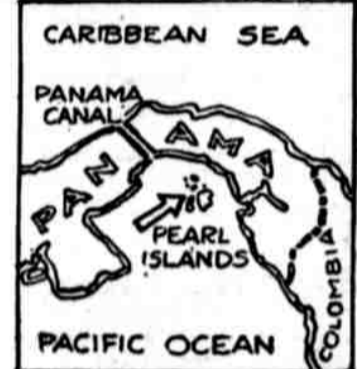

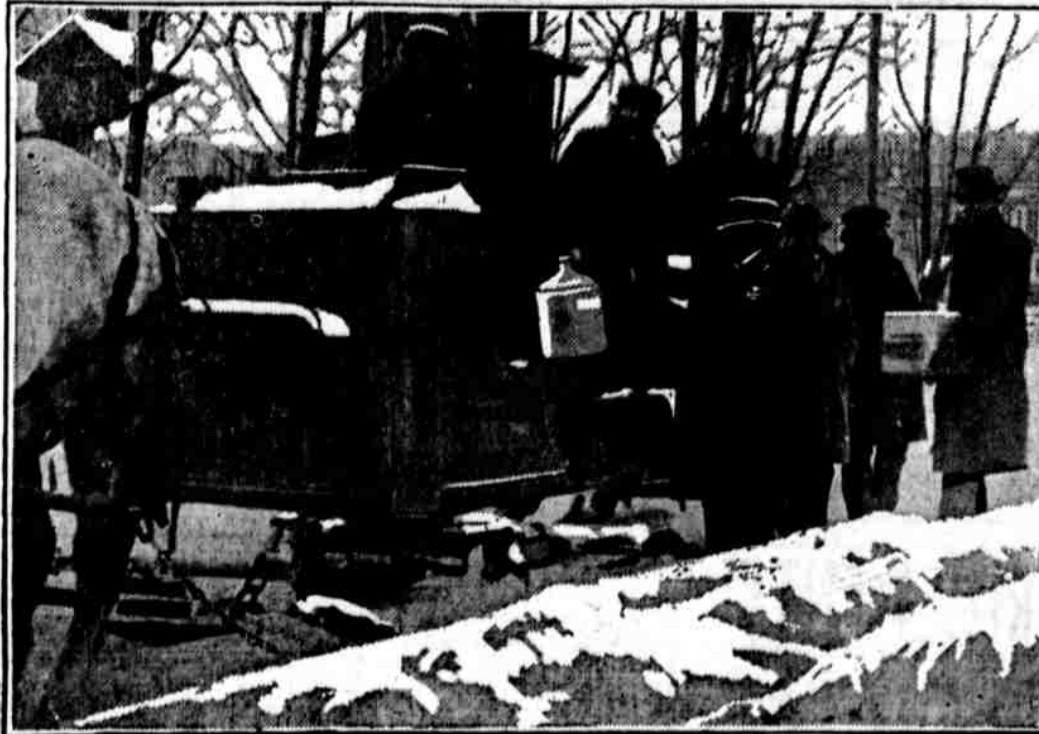

INCOME TAX AGENTS' ITINERARY ANNOUNCED

PORTLAND, Jan. 13—Collector of Internal Revenue Milton A. Miller today announced the itinerary of deputies throughout the state to receive and assist in making out income tax returns. John Wilkinson and G. G. Hewitt, of Medford, will be in Klamath Falls, and can be consulted relative to appraisements between January 31 and February 8, inclusive. Mr. Wilkinson will be at Malin on January 27, and in Merrill on January 28 and 29.

LEGISLATURE IS ADJOURNED TO FIRST OF WEEK

SALEM, Jan. 13.—Both houses of the legislature adjourned until noon Monday when they will convene in joint session to receive a special message from the governor. The governor has made no announcement of the nature of the message beyond saying that it deals with a constructive state question.

A special committee of five senate members and five house members will probably be appointed to consider all bills relative to the proposed reapportionment of the representation for several counties, and also with bills dealing with the creation of new congressional districts. This committee was proposed in a resolution introduced by Senator Upton.

The house game committee has decided upon a draft and report of the bill for the reorganization of the fish and game commission along lines agreed upon between sportsmen and commercial fishing interests. Among the power granted to the game commission is the right to open any closed season, and to close any open season at discretion.

PORTLAND, Jan. 13.—The police are working on clues to identify the blackmailer, "Shadow," who sent threatening letters to prominent men. Henry Jennings, Jr., who received two letters which he ignored, found on his desk yesterday a note printed in ink on stationery of his furniture company, reading: "I have been here. Shadow."
