Godowsky Landed By Hoffmann

At a meeting of the Music Study club on Friday evening, at the White Pelican hotel, so much enthusiasm was manifested by the ladies present in regard to bringing the world renowned pianist, Leopold Godowsky, that a contract was signed with Miss Alma Voedsich, representative of the International Concert bureau which is managing Mr. Godowsky's tours—and he will appear in concert in Klamath Falls, on Thursday evening January 27th.

The ladies of the Music Study club, wishing to make it possible for everybody to avail themselves of the opportunity to hear this great artist, have placed the price of tickets at \$1.50, throughout the house.

Mr. Godowsky is a warm personal friend of the other pianistic giant Josef Hoffmann. In a recent issue of Vanity Fair, Josef Hoffmann writes eloquently about his friend and colleague. "A few days ago I was asked, why is it that everybody loves Godowsky" and I answered: "Because his character is as true as gold, and his art as pure as crystal—little wonder that everyone who knows him and his art, loves him."

With this happy combination of high personal and artistic qualities, Godowsky exerts a strong influence upon his fellow-artists.

"I doubt if there are many pianists today who have not learned something from him; I know that I did, and I am thankful for it." If Chopin is regarded as the spirit of piano composition, Godowsky represents the spirit of pianistic expression, although his art aims still higher, since he is not only a reproductive artist, but a creative one as well. Hoffmann further says, "Not only the popular but sometimes even banal melodies and musical thoughts turn into poems of bewitching beauty when touched by his beautifying art—When we hear Godowsky play—we cannot help wondering whether the composer himself ever dreamed of such beauties of harmony and expression, as Godowsky imparts to them. Though a small man in stature, Godowsky is a master in his art."
