The ladies of the Music Study club, wishing to make it possible for everybody to avail themselves of the opportunity to hear this great artist, have placed the price of tickets at \$1.50, throughout the house.

Mr. Godowsky is a warm personal friend of the other pianistic giant Josef Hoffmann. In a recent issue of Vanity Fair, Josef Hoffmann writes elequently about his friend and colleague. "A few days ago I was asked, why is it that everybody loves Godowsky" and I answered: "Because his character is as true as gold, and his art as pure as crystal-little won-Peary expedition that reached the der that everyone who knows him and his art, loves him."
