Speakers at the convention will include William D. Stenhouse, governor of California, and Irving B. Hiett, president of the national association of real estate boards.

SCHOOL COACHES MAY BE BARRED BY NEW RULING

PORTLAND, Jan. 16.—High schools of Oregon will not be permitted to employ professional athletic coaches unless such coaches are regular certified teachers under contract with the school board, according to an amendment to the rules of the Oregon High School association adopted here recently by the department of city superintendents at the convention of the State Teachers' association.

The rule was put into effect as a result of expressions of principals of high schools that professional coaches not connected with the faculty frequently were found to have acquired influence in the affairs of the school greater than that of either the teachers or the board, so far as student activities were concerned.

Other rules adopted provided that each school in the association must send to the secretary a complete list of players eligible to compete in athletic events, giving date and place of birth, date of last entrance, subjects carried at date of certificate, number of high school credits carried at date of certificate, number of years played in each major sport; that students participating in athletics must maintain a passing grade in three full and regular subjects, and must have passed in three full and regular subjects the previous year. These provisions were made to eliminate "ringers."

Permission must be obtained by any member of the association to play any team outside, under another rule adopted. No school is to be given permission to play Columbia University of Portland, it was decided, because it was charged Columbia had not conformed to state association rules.

LEGION TO HOLD IMPORTANT MEETING JANUARY 20 AND 21

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 16.—The most important meeting of the American Legion ever held between national conventions will be called in this city, January 20 and 21, to arrange for a census of every ex-service man and woman in the country. The plan that national commander Hanford MacNider will present to delegates calls for personal interviews by Legion canvassers of all veterans.

C. R. Forbes, director of the United States Veterans' Bureau will come as the personal representative of President Harding and Federal Judge K. M. Landis, of Chicago will be one of the speakers. All state commanders, adjutants and national executive committee members, chairmen of standing committees and national Legion officials will be present. Representatives of the war and navy departments will also attend. The national executive committee of the American Legion Auxiliary, an organization of women relatives of Legion members, will meet concurrently.

The census will be known as a service and compensation campaign and is modeled after the "Iowa plan", successfully used in the state when Mr. MacNider was commander there. After approval by the convention, the census will be undertaken at once. The country will be divided into districts, with a Legion committeeman
