## 400 ACRES OF MERRILL RANCH UNDER WATER

MERRILL, Ore., Jan. 17.—Four hundred acres of the Haskin ranch is under water, or rather under ice, for when the water receded there remained an ice surface which prevented the cattle from feeding on the land. This ranch is under lease to Charles Shuke, and is located at the mouth of Lost river. The last storm brought the river up to 5 1/2 feet.

The mild weather is expected to exercise an effect upon the hay market, there being much surplus hay in this section.

Small bands of sheep are being brought into this section to feed and prepare for the lambing season.

The Merrill-Klamath Falls highway is in good condition with the exception of a few places, which are being graveled. About a mile is closed.

Feeding in the lava beds is said to be good, according to local sheepmen. D. P. McAuliffe brought in his sheep for a week, but kept them only until the storm lifted.
