Maybe Bob Emmitt Will Get in Game While He's There

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Jan. 21.—Barnyard golf, as the sport of pitching horseshoes has come to be popularly known, thrives in Florida, which always has been the mecca of the enthusiasts of the game in winter. Its supporters are looking forward to the national championship matches to be held here beginning on Washington's birthday, February 22d. Champions, ex-champions and would-be champions at present are busy practising, and two dozen or more courts are kept running here from morning till night. The championship matches will attract crack pitchers from all parts of the country.

The horse-shoe pitchers have developed the game to a high degree. The equipment of a first class park includes a lodge or club house for keeping the horse-hoes, a small hand laundry to wash and dry towels for use of the players during the progress of matches, hydrants of running water for the players to wash their hands after handling the shoes, which sink deeply into the soft earth about the pegs, a rake to keep the earth smooth about the pegs during matches, and a small blacksmith shop to keep the shoes and pegs in first class condition as the game is rough on them.

The courts require a pitching distance of 36 feet. A match of two men is called the walking game, as the players walk back and forth from peg to peg during the progress of the match. In a four-man match the players play partners and remain in their places at the end of the court.

In the tourneys 50 points constitute a game, while in ordinary contests 21 points is the total required by the winner. A "ringer" counts three points. The horse-shoes weigh about 2 1/4 pounds each. They are regulation horseshoes which have never been used on horses. Many fans carry their own shoes, and bestow on them the same care that a golfer does to his clubs.

CAL. SUPERVISORS TO TALK ROAD PROBLEMS

VISALIA, Calif., Jan. 21.—Highway problems are to be among the main topics considered at the 1921 convention of the State Supervisors association to be held here February 23-25.

One matter taken up will be the fixing by the legislature of the legal load allowed trucks on the state highways. Several county boards have adopted resolutions lately, claiming that the right of fixing the load weight belongs to the counties. A bill being considered by the legislature gives that right to the state.
