

IDAHO SHOWS GAIN
IN MINE PRODUCTION

BOISE, Idaho, Jan. 22.—An increase of over \$13,500,000 in the gross value of the mine products of Idaho in 1920 over those of 1919 is shown in the report issued by Robert M. Bell, state mining inspector of Idaho. The value of the mineral products for 1920 was \$32,854,857, compared with \$19,108,723 in 1919, an increase of \$13,746,134, the report said.

Lead mined during 1920 totalled 270,468,568 pounds; zinc, 21,981,000 pounds; copper, 1,981,200 pounds; silver, 7,495,713 ounces, and gold 24,047 ounces.

During 1919 the amount of lead mined was 185,984,000 pounds; zinc, 20,410,000 pounds; copper, 2,488,400 pounds; silver, 5,269,395 ounces, and gold, 28,775 ounces.

Big Hydro-Electric Development Likely On Flathead Lake

MISSOULA, Mont., Jan. 22.—Flathead lake, north of Missoula, will, within a short time, be the source of a great amount of hydro-electric power, according to information given out here by the United States forest service. The officials of headquarters of district No. 1 of the forest service, located in Missoula have been asked by the two companies for permission to begin power development projects on Flathead lake. The applications were originally made to the federal water power commission and referred by the commission to forest service officials here.

By damming the lake and raising the level of the water 30 feet above the mean low water level, the capacity of Flathead lake is estimated by Mr. Kramer to be 205,000 horsepower.

VOTED IN CHILE; BALLOT JUST RECEIVED

GREAT FALLS, Mont., Jan. 24.—More than two months after the election, the ballot of an absent voter has been received here. It was from A. L. Engle, now in Chile on business. His vote was delayed in the mails.

It is estimated that China has 400,000,000 tons of iron ore available and suitable for modern furnace practice, with an additional 300,000,000 tons that might be treated by native methods. China's production of pig iron is in the neighborhood of 500,000 tons a year.

It is stated that a Gothenburg engineer has invented a new building material much cheaper than, and in some respects superior to, brick. The material is easy to saw or chisel, has great bearing capacity, and twice the heat insulation efficiency of wood.

An important branch of the work of the United States Bureau of Fisheries consists in the rescue of commercial fishes from landlocked pools along the Mississippi River. During the past year some 155,000,000 of such fishes were taken from the shallow pools along the river and placed in open waters.

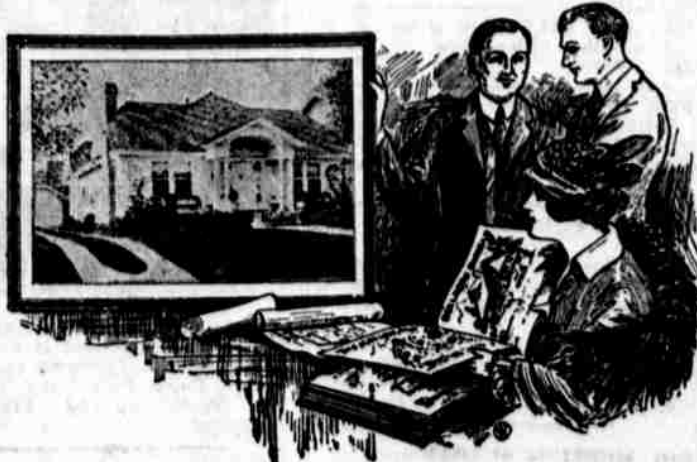
