CAUTION WITH MATCHES SAVES FROM FIRE LOSS

The one hundred million people in America use as many matches as the eight hundred million in the rest of the world, according to statistics of the National Fire Protection Association, an organization which has done so much toward eliminating the non-safety, strike anywhere match, so common a few years ago. It is estimated that 700,000,000 matches are lighted every day of the year, each match carrying the danger of a possible fire and loss of life.

If one is in need of a match anywhere in Continental Europe he must seek it in its proper place. Where do we find them in America? In almost every room in every building, public and private. They repose in pockets or linings of every old coat. They are scattered about desks, and in bureau drawers. They are so carelessly and recklessly thrown about that rats and mice have adopted them as a standard material for nest building, certain always of an available supply.

This little article, unknown until 1832, having grown to be one of the most important factors in our civilization, has been doing its best ever since its creation to destroy the world it was designed to serve. While this warning is being written a continual shower of imperfectly extinguished matches is falling into waste baskets, rubbish heaps, upon the rugs of clubs, hotels, dwellings and offices, thrown by careless smokers. Men reputed to be good fathers have been known to light cigars in the hallway of their homes, throw the match in the general direction of a cuspidor and go out; to return in half an hour to see firemen rescuing their sleeping children from second story windows.

The advent of the safety match has in no great measure reduced the appalling number of deaths to little children whose clothes and those of their playmates have taken fire from playing with matches their parents have carelessly left so easily within their reach. Several hundred little ones suffer death in this, its most horrible form, each year.

Are the mothers of Klamath Falls keeping their safety matches in a metal container far out of the reach of their children's hands? And do the grown-ups of the family also use matches in such a manner as to safeguard against every possible danger of fire? Remember that the spark is not always dead in the head of the match when the match seems to be out.

Would Increase Salaries of Klamath County Officers

SALEM, Jan. 25.—Bills were introduced into the senate today by Upton, joined by Representatives Burdick and Overturf, to increase salaries of officers of Jefferson, Crook, Lake and Klamath counties. They also introduced a bill to increase the salaries of district attorneys in Deschutes, Jefferson, and Klamath counties.

Small Brigade Cleanses all of Chicago's Windows

CHICAGO, Jan. 25.—Practically all the windows of Chicago's skyscrapers are cleaned by a small body of men—325—who are members of the Chicago Window Washers' Union, according to William McDade, business agent for the organization. The men work on a weekly basis, eight hours constituting a day's work. When conditions make outside work impossible, the men are employed on the inside.

The contract for cleaning the windows is given to contracting companies. These companies bid on the work and when the bids are accepted they furnish the men from the union. They also furnish all materials used in washing the windows, such as working harness for the washers, pails, sponges, chammois, etc. In fact they supply everything except the water. Every possible safety device known to the trade is employed by the union to protect its men from accidents.

The number of men killed doing this kind of work has been greatly lessened through the efforts of the union, Mr. McDade said. The contractors also have done much to safeguard the pedestrians below. In the past year, Business Agent McDade said the union lost only one man by death, while the number of accidents to its members has shown a big decrease.

The average union washer will clean about 100 windows a day the business agent said, as this is what the contracting companies figure on when giving their estimate on the work.

The membership of the union is made up of about 40 percent Americans, 50 percent Polish while the other 10 per cent is divided among members of the other nationalities, Mr. McDade said. About two-third of the members of the union are married men.
