

# PRaise RETIRED PROJECT CLERK

Honorable mention of the service rendered the reclamation service by C. C. Hogue, who recently retired, is contained in the current issue of the Reclamation Record, which says:

On October 1, 1920, Mr. C. C. Hogue resigned his position as senior clerk on the Klamath project. He had reached the age of 70 years, and was entitled to retire on an annuity under the retirement act of May 22, 1920, being the first employee of the Reclamation Service entitled to retire under this act.

Mr. Hogue came to Klamath Falls in June, 1905, and was associated with the Reclamation Service until his resignation. He served as chief clerk from November 1, 1905, to March 3, 1920.

Mr. Hogue has been active in local affairs. During the war he was a member, and later president, of the local Defense Committee. He was also a trustee of the local school board for many years, and has been elected a life elder of the Presbyterian church. Mr. Hogue came to Oregon in 1878, and first located at Albany. He was paymaster of the Corvallis-Eastern railroad during its construction. Later he was the manager of the Albany Light & Water Co. He was also manager and part owner of the Magnolia Flour mills.

Mr. Hogue is a man of fine character, a loyal employee of the Reclamation Service, and a respected citizen in the community. He leaves Klamath Falls with the best wishes of his acquaintances and fellow workers. After an extended tour with Mrs. Hogue through Canada and the eastern and southern states, Mr. Hogue contemplates making his home in San Francisco.

### OREGON BREVITIES

SALEM—Three tobacco dealers arrested here Saturday charged with violating the law prohibiting the selling of cigarettes to minors, held a conference and decided to contest the charges. Howard Damon, one of the defendants, will stand trial, and his co-defendants will abide by the verdict as final.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene—Gilmore Doble, for nine years coach of football at the University of Washington and at present occupying a similar position at Cornell, has been offered \$8,500 by the athletic council of the University of Oregon to coach football here. Under the contract offered Doble, he would coach football only, the agreement to run for a period of five years.

ROSEBURG—The annual grazing authorization for the Umpqua national forest has just been received at the supervisor's office. This authorization provides that for the coming season 10,600 head of sheep and 1,810 head of cattle may graze on the ranges of the forest. The above figures do not include lambs and calves under six months old, which are the natural increase of the permitted stock.

PORTLAND—Receiver W. D. Whitcomb, of Morris Brothers, Inc., has made public an analysis of the affairs of the bond house which he took over a month ago, when it was thrown into bankruptcy. His statement indicated that creditors will receive anywhere from 54 to 96 cents on the dollar.

MEDFORD—Work has started on the foundation for the big addition to the city hall building, which will parallel the height, width and length of the present city hall and which will rise on the city's vacant lot immediately adjoining at a cost yet to exceed \$6,000.

PORTLAND—The Victory co-operative laundry, a concern sponsored by the Central Labor Council, which

for some time has been regarded as somewhat of an unsuccessful venture, is suspended.

## CALIFORNIA NEWS

SACRAMENTO—Nevada cattlemen and Oregon sheepmen are finding excellent pastures now in the Sacramento valley, particularly the Sagebrush stockmen. Nearly 5000 head of Nevada cattle are grazing on good grass land now, of which amount 3000 head have been brought here recently by Sam Frank, wealthy stock owner of Reno.

SACRAMENTO—Governor Stephens for the second time has granted a reprieve to Simon Ruiz, young Mexican sentenced to be hanged at San Quentin prison today, extending the date to March 11, pending further investigation of the murder case in which Ruiz was alleged to have been involved.

ALTURAS—On account of the shortage of hay here, many of the local stockmen are shipping their stock to Fernley, Nev., where they can get feed for \$10 a ton.

CHICO—Marshal J. A. Peck has announced that he will strictly enforce the regulation regarding minors being forbidden to enter former saloons which have been converted into soft drink dispensaries, even though nothing stronger than one-half of one per cent is sold across the bars.

HONCUT—A proposition to dissolve the Honcut-Yuba Irrigation district was voted down at a meeting held in Honcut. Only a few of the large number of interested farmers present voted to abandon the project.

### NOTICE:

The public is hereby informed that the following listed Inherited and Non-Competent Indian lands under the jurisdiction of the Klamath Reservation, Oregon, are offered for sale under existing laws, in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Secretary of the Interior.

Sealed bids will be received for the following listed lands until 2:00 o'clock P. M. on February 15, 1921, at which time they will be opened at the Klamath Agency Office. Interested parties are invited to be present.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check on some solvent bank payable to the order of the undersigned as Superintendent, for ten per cent of the amount offered as a guarantee of the bidders faithful performance of his proposition. If the bid shall be accepted, and the successful bidder shall fail to comply with the terms of his bid, within thirty days after due notice such check shall be forfeited to the use of the owner of the land, less the cost of advertising, etc. All bids shall be marked with the allotment number at the top of the bid, and be inclosed in a sealed envelope which must be marked by the bidder, "Bid for Indian Land, to be opened — 1921" but the description of the land shall not be noted on the envelope. Under no circumstances will any person connected with the Klamath Agency or the Indian Service be permitted to bid, directly or indirectly, or to make or prepare any bid, or to assist any prospective bidder in making or preparing his bid.
