If any interested citizen of Klamath Falls will examine the fire department records at the city hall, particularly during the long dry spells, they will be struck by the number of needless fires caused by careless smokers.

In a certain Pacific coast city not long ago and during a spell of hot weather, the entire street front of one of its splendid office buildings was badly defaced by a careless smoker throwing a lighted cigar or cigarette from one of the lower windows igniting an awning below, which in turn communicated fire to all the awnings above.

Smoking in bed is the cause of numerous fires, which often result in the death of the occupant when in an intoxicated condition. Dropping off to sleep with a lighted cigarette in hand has ruined many a good bed.

Smokers' carelessness is responsible for numerous brush and grass fires during the dry season, these latter calling out the fire department on many a needless run if ordinary common sense and precautions were observed.

Lighted cigars and cigarettes carelessly thrown into rubbish heaps, or through sidewalk gratings round out the list of preventable fires for which the average smoker is responsible.

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allotment, he must submit a separate bid for each allotment he desires to purchase, and if he wishes less than an entire allotment, he must submit a bid for one or more legal subdivisions of such allotment. Purchaser shall pay costs of conveyancing, if any, and from \$1.50 to \$2.50 for advertising, in addition to a fee of \$20.00 for work incident to the sale payable when notified that he is the successful bidder. No bid for less than the appraised value shall be considered. Checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned after the opening of the bids.

The right to reject any or all bids is reserved to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Land sold is usually conveyed direct to the purchaser by Patent in fee simple from the United States. Each patent issued to the purchaser will contain the following clause: "And there is reserved from the lands hereby granted a right of way for ditches and canals constructed by the authority of the United States." Such charges as may be levied by the Department for such ditches etc., are a first lien against the lands benefited.

Approved leases hold until such time as they will expire, but the rental, after approval of the sale by the Interior Department will be payable direct to the purchaser.

The terms of this sale, under the cash payment plan, are ten per cent with the bid, and the additional ninety per cent within thirty days after the date of acceptance of bid by heirs or owners.

Bids may also be made by deferred payment plan, ten per cent with bid fifteen per cent within thirty days from date of notice of acceptance, twenty-five per cent one year from such date, twenty-five per cent in two years and twenty-five per cent in three years, with interest on deferred payments at eight per cent.

Owners of tracts will be urged to accept deferred payment bids if to their advantage, but they frequently refuse to sell on this plan, and the bidder runs the risk of his offer being refused. He may submit cash and deferred payment bids on the same tract. All bids are subject to acceptance or rejection by the Indian owners.

The township plats in the Agency Office at Klamath Agency, Oregon may be examined at any time during office hours.

Further information desired will be given upon request either in person or by letter. It is advisable for bidders to make a personal inspection of the tracts.

Bidders may submit as many separate alternate bids as they desire to make. These conditional bids should be marked "Alternate bid to be in effect only in case that my bids on other (specified) tracts are unsuccessful." A certified check for ten per cent of the amount of the highest bid submitted must be enclosed with the first choice bid and referred to in the alternate bids, which should be marked "second choice," "third choice" etc. This gives prospective settlers a better chance to secure a tract of some sort. Bids for land contingent upon securing other lands will be considered, if accompanied by check.

* Indicates tracts that are considered irrigable.

"Tbr"—denotes tracts that have some commercial timber on them.

Good agricultural lands can be found in Twp. 35, R. 7. Fine hay lands are located in Twps. 30 and 31, ranges 8 and 9. Remaining lands are suitable for grazing and hay raising.
