Child's Rescuer Awarded Medal

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 3.—For diving into the San Francisco bay to rescue a Russian child, Charles L. Mangels, a San Francisco policeman recently was given a prize of \$100 by the Red Cross. The prize was sent from the National Red Cross headquarters for the best life saving feat of 1920.

The rescued child, Vera Milhalova, one of the children aboard the Red Cross Children's ship which stopped here last year while enroute to Petrograd from Siberia, fell into the water at the dock here. Mangels dived in after her and held her up until help arrived.

Legislature to Free Cal. Statute Books Of Outgrown Laws

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Feb. 3.—An effort is to be made at the current session of the California legislature to erase from the books a number of laws that through the changes of time have become ineffective. One such, adopted in 1852 provided for appointment of a vaccine agent and for his fees and duties. Assemblyman J. R. White, Glendale, offered a repeal as part of the administration's efficiency plan.

Back in 1852 the legislature was flooded out, and had to go home in February to stay until March. There were no by passes provided for the Sacramento floods in those days. When the legislators went home, they found that a mild type of smallpox was rather prevalent, and that no apply of vaccine was available. So when they came back, without much debate they adopted a law authorizing the appointment of a "respectable physician" as state vaccine agent, directed him to procure and keep on hand a stock of "the vaccine" and provided a system of fees for his compensation.

Times have changed. There is no state vaccine agent, and has been none for many years. Hence the repeal now before the legislature.

Seminoles Consider Moving to Mexico

WEWOKA, Okla., Feb. 3.—At a conference of Seminole Indians held here recently a decision was reached whereby many Seminole Indians now living in Seminole county, will move to Mexico next summer to live upon a reservation allotted to them in 1850 by the Mexican government, if claims to the land can be established.

Louis F. Brown, chief of the Seminoles and son of former Gov. J. P. Brown, with a delegation of fourteen Seminole leaders, have left for Mexico City to confer with President Obregon and ask his decision on the claim.

Chief Brown is in possession of a copper medal upon which the original treaty was made to the tribe, granting the reservation to the Indians, which he will take with him to offer as proof of the grant. The only question that is uncertain in the minds of the Seminole leaders, is whether the new Mexican regime will recognize the treaties of the old rulers.

Members of the tribe who will migrate to Mexico are those who have sold their allotments in Seminole county, following the removal of restrictions, the Seminole chief said. Having no homesteads, they desire to live according to their old ways and customs.

The reservation which the Seminoles claim was granted to them, adjoins that of the Kickapoo Indians in northern Mexico and consists of several thousands of acres of fertile soil. The reservation was at one time occupied by the Seminoles, old Indians say, but many of them moved to Oklahoma after the civil war when the land was allotted to them. Slaves of the Indians, who remained in Mexico when their masters moved into Oklahoma, are still living on this reservation, the Seminoles declare.
