Ruler of Afghans Orders Motorcycles

BOMBAY, Dec. 31. (By Mail).—
Life in Afghanistan is speeding up,
writes a frontier correspondent of
the Times of India.

Three carloads of motor-cycles
have recently arrived at Jellalabad
for Prince Kasir Jan, the Director
of Communications, who intends to
organize a despatch rider service
throughout the country.

Orders have been issued by the
Amir's government for contracts to
construct macadamized roads thru
the country to the capital, and for
the importation of automobile ve-
hicles. Firms are also invited to es-
tablish woollen mills and sugar re-
fineries at Kabul, the capital.

Criminals Flee From U. S. to London

SOUTHAMPTON, Eng. Jan. 20.
(By Mail)—Criminals driven out of
New York by the efforts to suppress
the crime wave there are fleeing to
England as stowaways on British
ships, say the British marines. One
captain told a magistrate here that
stowaways had been discovered on
board every Cunard ship that sailed
from New York for England for the
last three months.

Eight stowaways were found on
the liner Imperator on her last trip.
They were sentenced to pay a fine of
20 pounds each or serving one month
in prison.

Serbiens Forbid Entry to Dutch

THE HAGUE, Jan. 14. (By Mail)
—The rupture of diplomatic rela-
tions between Holland and Jugoslav-
ia has resulted in the virtual prohibi-
tion of travel of Dutchmen in Serbia.
The Jugoslav government has an-
nounced it will not grant visas to
Hollanders.

The break occurred over alleged
bad treatment of M. Rappaport, an
Austrian subject, who was Dutch con-
sul at Belgrade during the war. The
Serbians contended he was an en-
