RESOLUTION

A Resolution Declaring the Intention of the City of Klamath Falls to Change the Grade on Washington Street Beginning On the Easterly Line of Third Street and Extending from Third Street to Fifth Street.

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient to change the present grade on Washington Street beginning on the easterly line of Third Street and extending from Third Street to Fifth Street, BE IT RESOLVED that the Common Council hereby declares its intention to change the grade to read as follows:

Beginning on Washington Street at the Easterly line of Third Street grades shall be established as follows:

Elevations. South Sidewalk 225; South Curb 226; North Curb 226; North Sidewalk 226.5.

Thence on a uniform grade to center of block (or at 132 feet towards 4th St. 220, 223, 223, 225.75.

Thence on a uniform grade to the westerly line of 4th Street. 219, 222, 223, 224.5.

Thence to the easterly line of 4th street, 224, 226, 227, 228.0.

At 53.2 feet, 227.2, 229.2, 229.8, 232.0.

At 106.4 feet, 230.4, 232.4, 232.6, 235.5.

At 159.6 feet, 234.3, 236.9, 237.1, 239.0.

At 212.8 feet, 238.9, 242.7, 243.3, 245.25.

At 266.0 feet, 243.5, 248.5, 249.5, 251.5, and that at breaks in grade, curbs and sidewalks there are to be such verticle curves as the city engineer shall direct.

NOTICE INVITING PROPOSALS TO PURCHASE SEWER BONDS

Sealed proposals will be received by the Common Council of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, until Monday, the 14th day of March, A. D. 1921 at the hour of 8 o'clock P. M. of said day, at the city hall in said city at which time and place proposals to purchase will be opened and considered, for the purchase of \$50,735.00, city of Klamath Falls, general obligation bonds, payable 20 years from date of issue, bearing a rate of interest not exceeding six per cent per annum; interest payable semi-annually; principal and interest payable at Oregon Fiscal Agency in the city of New York, State of New York, or at the office of the treasurer of said city as determined by mutual agreement of purchaser and council. These bonds are to be issued in denominations of one thousand dollars, (\$1000.00) each, and to be numbered from one to fifty-one inclusive.

Said bonds are to be issued in pursuance of Ordinance No. 498 of said city; and are to be issued for the purpose of installing a sewer system in the territory known as Mills Addition, in accordance with the plans, specifications and estimates of the city engineer. Each proposal to purchase said bonds must be accompanied by a check for 5% of the amount of the proposal certified by some responsible bank and payable to said city. Proposals must be sealed and endorsed: "Proposals to purchase Mills Addition sewer bonds."

Said bonds are to be sold for cash at date of delivery, and for a price not less than par.

The right to reject any and all proposals, is hereby reserved.

The City Engineer pursuant to the resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having under date of the 21st day of January, 1921, filed plans, specifications and estimates of the cost of improving Pine Street from Eleventh Street to Esplanade, including intersections; and the Common Council having taken the same under advisement and finding said plans, specifications and estimates satisfactory.

IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, That said plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of Pine Street from Eleventh Street to Esplanade, including intersections, be and the same are hereby approved;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve said portions of Pine Street, in accordance with said plans, specifications and estimates; said improvement to consist of paving said portions of Pine Street with Concrete, Bitulithic or Willite. The estimated cost of the improvement of said portions of said street by placing thereon either Concrete, Bitulithic or Willite to be \$12,562.90, said cost including grading, rolling, curbing and cement sidewalk.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, By the Common Council that the following described property be and is hereby declared benefited by said improvement, to-wit:

Lots 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 of Block 2, Hot Springs Addition to City of Klamath Falls, Oregon; Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, Block 3, Hot Springs Addition to City of Klamath Falls, Oregon; also property described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the Southerly line of Pine Street with the easterly line of 11th street; thence northeasterly along the southerly line of Pine Street, 120 feet; thence southeasterly at right angles to Pine Street, 65 feet; thence southwesterly at right angles to 11th Street 120 feet; thence northwesterly along the easterly line of 11th Street to the point of beginning; also, Beginning at the intersection of the northerly line of Main Street with the easterly line of 11th street running thence easterly along the northerly line of Main Street, 58 feet; thence northerly parallel with 11th street, 100 feet, thence westerly parallel with Main Street, 58 feet, to the easterly line of 11th street. Thence southerly along the easterly line of 11th street to the point of beginning; also, Beginning at a point on the northerly line of Main Street, 120 feet easterly from the intersection of the northerly line of Main Street and the easterly line of 11th street; thence northerly at right angles to Main Street 240 feet to the southerly line of Pine Street, thence easterly along southerly line of Pine Street 120 feet; thence southerly at right angles to Main Street, 240 feet to the northerly line of Main Street 120 feet to the beginning; also, Beginning at a point on the easterly line of 11th street 65 feet southeasterly from the intersection of the southerly line of Pine Street with the easterly line of 11th street; thence southeasterly along the easterly line of 11th street 75 feet; thence at right angles to 11th street northeasterly 55 feet; thence at right angles northwesterly parallel with 11th street 75 feet; thence at right angles to 11th street southwesterly 58 feet to the point of beginning, all said property being in Hot Springs Addition to City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, and that said property above listed and described be and is hereby declared to be assessed for the expense of said improvement.
