RACE HORSE KELLY'S OWN STORY HOW JESSE JAMES ESCAPED POSSE THE VENGEANCE OF RAIN-IN-THE-FACE

Note.—The following recital of some of the adventures in the life of the late Harry Kelly, better known as Race Horse Kelly, was taken down in writing by a friend as it fell from the old trainer's lips shortly before his recent death at the county hospital.

I was born on the Belmont ranch near Nashville, Tennessee, as a slave in the household of Old Marae Hardin; and there under the care of a man whom I loved with all my heart passed my boyhood, I was the body guard of my young Miss Agnes in my youthful years, and a trusted family servant.

For Stars and Bars

When the war broke out in '61 I went to the front with Kunnel Hardin. I was old enough to understand what it all meant, and that the success of the Union cause might bring me freedom, but I loved my ole Marae and the little misses and I went along with Kunnel Hardin to do what I could for the confederates.

At the battle of Stone's River—which lasted from Christmas day in '61 to New Year's day, '62—I was captured by northern troops and taken to Nashville, where I was turned over to Colonel Ruso, commander of the Cumberland. I had Colonel Hardin's two horses, "St. Patrick" and "Miss Free Trade," which had been captured with me along, and Colonel Ruso liked the looks of the horses and told me to take them to Colonel Cunningham's mansion, which I did. I stayed with 'em and trained 'em, putting the vim into 'em against the day when they should race again. And, boy, when that day did come they sho'ly did run.

After the war I went to live in the family of General John Cheat-ham. I raced General John's horses and the two Hardin horses all over the south. Then I went to Cincinnati and raced there in '68 for Phil Davis and other old time owners of fast stock. I rode old Chickamauga and Shenadoah, two fast ones of their day, on the Cincinnati track.

I started west in the spring and brought out a bunch of horses for Colonel Tom Duncan of Stewartsville, Missouri. The next spring was '70 and Colonel Duncan sold out to a lot of Dutch colonists and sent me to Plattsville with his horses to Colonel Bixby's ranch. From there I took two horses, Santankee and Nugget, to Denver. Santankee went blind and the colonel sent him to Kentucky.

Met the James Gang

I quit Colonel Duncan that fall and went to Kansas City, and over to Missouri to the Clay county tracks where I rode for Jim Braashfield. The James boys held up the track that fall and took the pool and the gate receipts. I was out on the track on old Revolution at that time.

And here's a funny thing! Jesse and Frank had an old colored mammy and she was a whopper. She lived close there and the posse was after the boys, awful close. The James boys was stopped at their mammy's house and Jesse was in the kitchen after something to eat. There come a knock on the door and Jesse could think of no place to hide, but old Aunt Judy told him to crawl under her skirts. He did it and the posse never caught him that time.

I suppose everybody knows that the James boys were born right close to Libertyville, Missouri, where this holdup took place.

Well I just travelled around from there, all up and down the Missouri valley. In the fall of '72 I went to Leavenworth, Kansas, and rode for Colonel Jensen and Captain Bill Tough. Captain Bill was United States marshal then.

Coachman for Gen. Miles

Maybe I got some of my dates mixed, but you old timers can straighten that out, and as for Missouri and Oregon here, there's just kids, and it don't make no difference. I rode Old High Fields the next year, and Topeka Bill and Pine Leaf. Then I quit the track for a spell and went to work as coachman for General Nelson A. Miles, and went with him to the Little Bighorn country, when he was called to aid General Custer in '76.

And then the general was massacred 18 miles from Fort Custer. I was right there beside General Custer and I seen his body all wrapped in a green blanket, and po' Tom his brother laying beside him with his heart cut out and stuck in his mouth. The general was shot square through the head. Rain-in-the-Face is the guy who was responsible for Colonel Tom's death. It all happened over some little meanness that Rain-in-the-Face done, and Colonel Tom had to punish him, and the old Injin said then he would kill him some day

and cut his heart out and stick it in his mouth. (Rain-in-the-Face had killed a man with an axe handle and Colonel Custer sent him to the guardhouse.)

Helped Build Fort Keogh

Well, we went from there with General Miles and built Fort Keogh, and then winter came. We had 350 beef cattle for meat, and a band of Sioux came and ran them off. We followed them and captured our cattle at Little Wolf mountain. We got back to camp on Christmas day, and we had no pay for seven months, and were a pretty glum and lonesome bunch.

One Christmas Dinner

Well, we done the best we could. I stretched a buffalo hide over a hollow log and beat out Injin music while the rest danced around the fire. We had buffalo and antelope for our dinner. But the grub run shy toward spring, and we cut cottonwoods along the Yellowstone and waited for the boats to come in the spring. And at last they did come, and that was sure a tickled bunch of toes as they bowed to us as we went away, thankful that we had spared their lives.

Back to the Track

Well, we had the last scrap with the Nez Perces at Bear Paw Mountain up in Montana, and then I got itchin' for race horses again, and went back east.

Well, boys, I'm kinda tired now, and I reckon I will go rest. Maybe some time I will tell you what happened to me up at Dutch Jake's up in Spokane. And about the time I danced the hula on the beach at Wai-kiki in Hawaii, and about the time Till Glaze was killed by Bud Howard up in Burns, Oregon, and about the time me and Wild Bill stole his wife's horse, and how I won the \$1000, and about me and the Spanish dancer at Albuquerque. But not this time. I'm tired, so help me back to my chair by the stove. Sho' does me good to talk about the good old times.
