It is unusual that Mr. DeHaven should himself have experienced practically the identical circumstances of Signor Monti, only instead of being unknown singer, in his case it was dramatic talent that was being wasted.

That was his start and his rise has been rapid until today he holds a place as one of our foremost comedians, both of the spoken and the silent drama.

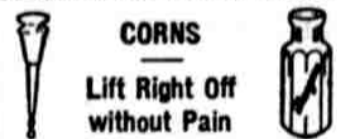
