Alfay Over Woman

On Monday he is said to have forged a check on the father for \$50. The same night he took the daughter to the theater and entertained her royally on the father's money. Tuesday he is said to have forged an identical check for \$287.50, after which he left the city for San Francisco, where he took a boat to Honolulu. On the island he got into trouble with a native over a woman, and was badly cut during a fight which followed.

Shortly after this fight, Nelson returned to San Francisco, then went to Seattle, then back to San Francisco, then to Oakland, Cal., where he put out about \$800 in checks, and then to Klamath Falls, where he was arrested.

Pretty Helen Bassinger, aged 19, entertainer at the Arcade dance hall, Oakland, gave Pinkerton detectives the information that brought about Nelson's arrest.

The Bassinger girl betrayed her sweetheart on learning that Nelson's recent departure for the north was not, as he had told her, for the purpose of bringing back prisoners in his role of a United States secret service official, but was simply to rejoin an old sweetheart, Dolores La Rue, a French dancing teacher.

Confronted with evidence of his attentions to another woman, she showed the detectives letters from him dated Dunsmuir, Cal., and Klamath Falls.

Thirty years ago Miss Cobden was fined \$800 for acting as a member of the London county council. Though regularly elected to the office, she was disqualified for "being a woman."

Miss A. Viola Smith, who has been appointed secretary of the American commercial attaché in Peking, is said to be the first woman to hold an official post in the foreign trade service of the United States.

TWO YEARS OF MELODRAMA IN NELSON'S LIFE

The arrest of Gordon E. Nelson, alleged forger, here last week by Sheriff Low and Chief of Police Wilson, ended a chase by the Pinkerton detective agency and police of three states, that extended from San Francisco to Seattle and back several times and across the Pacific to Honolulu and back. Descriptions of Nelson's short but meteoric career in Portland and San Francisco papers read like a melodrama. The story of a woman, who believed herself scorned, finally sprung the trap upon him.

On his first trip to Portland, Nelson, who was familiarly known as "Freddie," is said to have forged a number of checks on Portland banks. In order to keep her son out of jail, his aged mother, who lives at Preuss, Oregon, went to Portland and refunded the banks the amount her son had secured.

From Portland Nelson went to Seattle, where he is charged with putting out \$800 worth of forged checks during March, 1920.

Returning to Portland he was arrested March 28 in the Fashion garage by deputy sheriffs and held for Seattle, but before he was returned the sheriff's office learned that Nelson had put out three more checks in Portland upon his return. He was held in the county jail more than two months awaiting trial.

A Parole Violator
In June he was sentenced to three years in the Salem penitentiary, but was paroled from the bench by the judge on condition that he return with his mother to the farm and refund the Portland banks at the rate of \$25 per month.

Early in July Nelson wrote to District Attorney Evans and requested permission to leave the quiet town of Preuss for the excitement of Portland, where he could make more money. Evans refused to grant the permission, and advised Nelson to remain at home and not break the conditions of his parole. Nelson broke his parole, however, and came to Portland. He met a young woman and was invited to her home for Sunday dinner. While in the house he saw the father's bank book.
