NOTICE INVITING PROPOSALS TO PURCHASE SEWER BONDS

Sealed proposals will be received by the Common Council of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, until Monday, the 14th day of March, A. D. 1921 at the hour of 8 o'clock P. M. of said day, at the city hall in said city at which time and place proposals to purchase will be opened and considered, for the purchase of \$50,735.00, city of Klamath Falls, general obligation bonds, payable 20 years from date of issue, bearing a rate of interest not exceeding six per cent per annum; interest payable semi-annually; principal and interest payable at Oregon Fiscal Agency in the city of New York, State of New York, or at the office of the treasurer of said city as determined by mutual agreement of purchaser and council. These bonds are to be issued in denominations of one thousand dollars, (\$1000.00) each, and to be numbered from one to fifty-one inclusive.

Said bonds are to be issued in pursuance of Ordinance No. 493 of said city; and are to be issued for the purpose of installing a sewer system in the territory known as Mills Addition, in accordance with the plans, specifications and estimates of the city engineer. Each proposal to purchase said bonds must be accompanied by a check for 5% of the amount of the proposal certified by some responsible bank and payable to said city. Proposals must be sealed and endorsed: "Proposals to purchase Mills Addition sewer bonds."
