FORM PLAN TO BUY PARKHURST CONCESSIONS

Rodney L. Glisan of Portland is chairman of a committee chosen in Portland Friday to arrange financial details for the purchase of the Parkhurst concession at Crater Lake, adequately equip the hotel and make it a modern tourist attraction. Other members of the committee are H. R. Butler, Hood river; J. R. Wheeler, R. W. Childs and Sydney B. Vincent, Portland. Their duties were stated to be the work of organizing sufficient Oregon people into a company, capital stock of which, it was estimated, should be not less than \$250,000 immediately available and an equal sum of reserve; the taking over of the concessions now held by Mr. Parkhurst and the placing of the lake resort in first-class condition for future activities.

"It's just a matter of getting the money," declared Governor Olcott, who declared that "it is time to quit talking and to get to work and make of Crater lake park what it should be—the greatest scenic resort in the northwest."

The governor, in a brief speech at the close of the meeting, asked the people of the state to get behind the project financially, if possible, but morally, anyway, and help to make it what it is admitted to be, namely, one of the world's greatest scenic marvels. He pledged his official and personal aid in so doing.

Speakers included A. B. C. Dohrman, chairman of the California resort concessions organization which made Yosemite world-famous; Horace Allbright, superintendent of the Yellowstone national park and field agent for the bureau of parks; O. E. McCormick, a vice-president of the Southern Pacific company, and Mr. Parkhurst, who has to date done the pioneer work in Crater park.

Mr. Dohrman bears the distinction of serving on the only committee ever formed in California, half of whose members are residents of Los Angeles and half from San Francisco. He said that it was considered so important to have the entire state of California back of the movement to make Yosemite park a state-wide project that the unprecedented thing was done in the naming of the committee. Since other sections of the state have been linked up with the feature and it is being made a very great resort feature, Mr. Dohrman said.

According to Mr. Dohrman, experience in tourist resorts all over the west has proved that, from a money-making standpoint, transportation is the big feature. He also emphasized the tremendous value of linking up with any big resort, such as Yosemite or Crater lake, other attractions, such as Lake Tahoe in California and Klamath lakes in Oregon, so that instead of advertising one feature alone, the tourist is offered a regular programme of travel and recreation.
