WASPS WILL AID IN PROPAGATION OF FIGS.

SYDNEY, N. W. Mar. 22.—Wasps by the thousands are being collected here for exportation to Hawaii, where they are needed to help propagate Moreton Bay fig trees. The trees were introduced into Hawaii from Australia years ago and grow very well but never could propagate their species because of the absence of a particular wasp said to be necessary to perform the act of pollenisation.

The wasps are being gathered under the direction of C. E. Pemberton, entomologist for the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association.
