BOY AND GIRL WORKERS GOING BACK TO SCHOOL

CHICAGO, March 22.—The office boy is going back to school. Fourteen, fifteen and sixteen-year-old girl stenographers are reentering high school.

Increase in school membership in the United States during 1920-21 is approximately 1,500,000 over 1919-20, according to a survey just completed here by the better schools service, a bureau of the American federation of teachers.

Estimates show that the 20,000,000 figure for the present school membership of the nation must be increased by 1,500,000 at least, said Wm. T. McCoy chairman of the better schools service.

The greatest rush of attendance has taxed the already overcrowded schools to the limit. In large cities and in mining and industrial centers schools are over-pupilled and under-teached to the point where the work done is bitterly unfair to the children.

Considerable opposition had been in evidence but recently, owing to fear of increased taxes, and it was an agreeable surprise to the high school promoters to find this opposition so greatly reduced.

The Klamath Falls Evening Herald helped win support to the cause by giving space and prominence to news which would explain the need and low cost of the school.

Work will start on the actual construction of the building within a few weeks, it is expected.
