

DORRIS FEELS HOUSING NEED

DORRIS, Cal., March 23.—Housing for the surplus population that fluctuates with activity in the lumber industry is one of the urgent needs of Dorris. During the winter, every building at all available was occupied by a family or by one or more single men employed by the local box factories. Now that this industry is beginning to operate on a normal basis once more, the situation with relation to houses for laborers and their families is growing more acute. A building and loan concern would be a welcome enterprise in this town. There is need of at least 20 houses.

Louis Boldischar, cashier of the Main State bank, accompanied by George Vochatzer, a prominent farmer of the Tule Lake region, drove over today by way of Oklahoma. These gentlemen spent the day in Dorris and Macdoel on business.

Bud McKenzie, local violinist and an employee of the Associated Lumber and Box company, has departed on an extended business trip which will take him to Portland and afterward south to San Francisco. Mrs. McKenzie will remain at Dorris during her husband's absence.

Harry Peltz, salesman for a wholesale tobacco and candy house, is down from Klamath Falls today soliciting orders from local merchants.

Edwin Cross, who resides on a ranch near Calor, was in town today with the skins of seven large coyotes, caught in traps and shot during the winter. The skins are the finest specimens exhibited here for several months.

Antonio De Freitas, prominent rancher from the vicinity of Calor, was a Dorris visitor today on business.

B. Long, owner of the new theatre now in construction, will make a trip to San Francisco within a few days to purchase materials for the completion of his building.

Girls of the Dorris high school, with the cooperation of several other persons, have succeeded in bringing about a radical change in the appearance of the school yard. The grounds will be fenced and grass will be planted for a lawn. The student body of the high school is composed exclusively of girls, 14 in number. Mr. J. Stringfield is the instructor.

Strawberry culture has proved so successful in and around Dorris on a small scale during the last two years that one farmer has gone into the business this spring on a commercial basis. Mr. G. F. Girard has planted more than 10,000 plants of the ever-bearing variety and expects to supply the community with berries from his patch.

PRESBYTERIANS IN SUCCESSFUL YEARLY MEETING

One hundred people sat down to the annual dinner of the Presbyterian church and congregation Monday night. The basement was tastefully decorated with plants and flowers. The tables were arranged in the large central dining hall so that all were together for the sumptuous meal, which was served by the Woman's Auxiliary.

At the close of the dinner hour, the business session was called to order by the pastor, Rev. E. P. Lawrence. Reports were received from all the organizations of the church, showing the work and progress of the past year. The first year in the new church has shown a most gratifying growth of the church in numbers and interest and spirit in every department.

Thirty nine new members have been added to the church thus far, with expectation of 25 or more at Easter time. Twenty-four have been dismissed to other churches.

The Woman's Missionary society reported the largest collection of benevolent and missionary funds in their history, \$250. These have been disbursed to the regular boards which they serve, also to the Armenian and China Famine fund.

The Woman's Auxiliary report funde to the amount of \$122 raised during the year.

The Kedron club has had a good year as a Bible study class social organization and has raised \$185.

The benevolences of the church treasurer showed \$777 expended to the various boards of the church and for local and famine relief calls.

Mr. Rice, said Mr. Lawrence, is one of the promising young men of the church, and has had experienced, in business, farming, Chautauqua work, Christian Endeavor, Y. M. C. A. and church work. He is a pleasing speaker, and of attractive personality, a graduate of the University of California and McCormick seminary, Chicago. After some discussion the congregation extended him an invitation to come for a year as stated supply with a view to a call as permanent pastor as soon as both church and minister are satisfied they are suited to each other.

NOTICE INVITING PROPOSALS TO MAKE STREET IMPROVEMENTS

Pursuant to Ordinance and order of the Common Council of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, notice is hereby given that proposals will be received by said common council for making the improvements designed for Fourth street, from Klamath avenue to the southerly line of Oak avenue; Fifth street from Klamath avenue to the southerly line of Willow avenue; Walnut avenue from the northerly line of Fourth street to the southerly line of Sixth St. Oak Ave. from the northerly line of Fourth St. to the southerly line of Seventh street, Willow avenue from the northerly line of Fifth street to the southerly line of Sixth street, together with all intersections between the respective termini not already improved.

Said proposed improvements to be made in accordance with the plans and specifications of the city engineer for either of the classes of improvement mentioned in said plans and specifications and the ordinance ordering the making of said proposed improvement, which said Ordinance is numbered 540, and was adopted on the 21st day of February, A. D. 1921, and by the mayor approved on the 23rd day of February, A. D. 1921.

The plans and specifications referred to above are on file with the Police Judge and with the city engineer of said city.

The contract for making the proposed improvements will be let in one contract, and the time in which the same is to be completed, is fixed by said ordinance for Sept. 1st, 1920.

Bids must be filed with the Police Judge for submission to the council not later than 8 o'clock p. m. of the 28th day of March, 1921, at which time, at the council chamber in the city hall, all proposals will be opened and considered.

Each proposal must be accompanied by a certified check on some responsible banking institution equal to 5% of the aggregate amount of the proposal, the same to be forfeited to the city, upon failure of the successful bidder to enter into contract and bond for the faithful completion of the proposed improvement in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor. The right to reject any and all proposals is hereby reserved. The award to the successful bidder is hereby made contingent upon the sale of the bonds that will be authorized for providing necessary funds for financing the proposed improvement.

The plans specifications and estimates of the city engineer provide for and specify for the hard surfacing either Bitulithic, Oil Macadam or Concrete; and bids are respectfully invited on each class of hard surfacing, in addition to grading, curbing, drainage and cement sidewalk.
