NAPA, Cal., March 25.—No answer has yet been filed to an attack upon the will of the late D. P. Doak, millionaire of Napa, launched in the superior court here by Mrs. Sara Doak of Los Angeles, the mother of the decedent. The estate is believed to be worth close to \$2,000,000. The plaintiff in this action was cut off without a bequest in the will, although the deceased directed that she be properly cared for by Mrs. Frieda Vocke Doak, wife of the testator to whom the bulk of the big estate was bequeathed.

Among the property of the two million dollar estate is the Doak ranch on Upper Klamath lake.
