

# NEW TOWN TO BE ERECTED

DORRIS, Cal., March 28.—This valley can soon boast of a new town which will be thoroughly modern and up-to-date in every respect with a purely industrial population of nearly a thousand. The new town will be called Garner City, receiving its name from its proximity to Garner Mountain, eight miles south and east of Bray on the line of the California Northwestern railroad, from which railroad a line will be extended to the little lumber city.

The new town is being built by the Weed Lumber company for the purpose of logging a vast tract of timber owned by them in that section. Garner City will be equipped with all the necessary buildings, including school houses, a city hall and other municipal buildings.

The inhabitants will consist of the necessary office employees and woodsmen for the maintenance of a large logging camp. No lumber will be sawed at Garner City but the timber will be shipped to Weed where the Company's mill is located.

Farmers near Dorris are active in the preparation for spring farming. From the standpoint of moisture the soil is in better condition than it has been for five years which fact accounts for wholesale optimism. Farmers are going ahead this spring with more confidence and on a larger scale than ever despite the depression in financial circles. Numerous tractors are coming into the valley with the result that more acreage will be turned and seeded to grains this year than in previous seasons.

## HOSPITAL READY FOR WAR VETERANS APR. 15

HELENA, Mont., March 28.—Dr. T. D. Tuttle, commander at Fort Harrison here, has informed the United States public health service chief that if requisitions are honored promptly the rehabilitation hospital at the post for world war veterans will be ready for use by April 15 with 107 beds. Dr. Tuttle who was formerly secretary of the Montana state board of health, arrived here recently to take charge at the hospital.

# POLAND WANTS OCEAN FLEET

WARSAW, March 5. (By Mail).—Polish statesmen are trying to find a way to build up a fleet of merchant vessels to ply the seven seas. Pushed back from the salt water when Poland lost her independence and was partitioned by Prussia, Russia and Austria, the new republic, by the treaty of Versailles, was granted an outlet to the Baltic.

The Polish government is aiding the private concerns to finance the operation of several vessels plying chiefly between English, French and Holland ports. Other firms are extending the service to America. Poland's Ministry of War has just purchased four monitors as the foundation of the Vistula fleet. Six torpedo boats, assigned to Poland by the council of ambassadors, formerly having been a part of Germany's naval forces, are now undergoing repairs in England.

A navy bureau of the Ministry of Trade and Industry has been formed by the Polish government and a naval school has been established at Tchef, or Tezew (Polish spelling) on the Vistula, just outside the limits of the free city of Danzig. The course of the academy is to be conducted along lines of modern English naval schools, an English naval mission having spent some time in Poland assisting the new government in inaugurating its program.

TRAPS 14 PANTHERS. LIBBY, Mont., March 28.—Bob Bakker, local mountain lion catcher and guide, has brought his season's catch of lions up to 14, all taken alive. The last catch was a female and three cubs. Bakker sends them to zoos in various parts of the country.

JERUSALEM, March 3. (By Mail).—Bandits have flourished in the Holy Land as well as in other parts of the world since the beginning of the war. The police are now trying to put an end to their activities.

Abdul Hadi Kaba, the notorious outlaw leader, who is said to have several murders to his own personal credit, was shot and killed at Zichron Jaob recently while attempting with several companions to escape arrest.

The Gallilee district police, in cooperation with the authorities of Ajlun, successfully attacked the Spitan section of Mudeira's gang of bandits at Kafr Abil and captured several of them. Mudeira himself is a fugitive on the other side of the Jordan and it is believed that his followers are scattered.

(Herald Washington Bureau) WASHINGTON, March 28.—With in a few weeks Director Davis of the reclamation service will have on the grounds the committee of inspection for the Deschutes irrigation project for which \$400,000 was appropriated in the sundry civil bill after Representative Sinnott made a successful fight. The personnel of this committee for inspection and preliminary survey is tentatively as follows: Colonel Cavanagh, United States engineers, represent the water power commission; F. F. Henschaf, of the geological survey, who some years ago co-operated with

City Engineer Lewis in preparing an exhaustive report on this project; F. W. Hanna, engineer of the reclamation service, and O. C. Henry of Portland, a well-known engineer interested in the irrigation and reclamation project.
