Better Milk and Better Service

Klamath Falls, Ore., April 1, 1921. On January 1st, of this year we took over from the Milk Producer's Association their plant, located at 13 Main St., commonly known as the old Brewery. When we took the plant

over we issued a short letter, stating we had bought the plant and would speak to the people again through the press, but owing to such disagreeable weather since that time, we have had to get along as best we could, as it was almost impossible to receive our milk at the plant and distribute it, as we wished. Now the weather looks better and we are prepared to offer to the good people of Klamath Falls, good milk and cream. At present we are the only people in the city that pasteurize milk. We have a good building for the business, a stone building with concrete floors. We use all the sanitary means, of which we have learned and try to keep posted on the latest methods of sanitation. As mentioned in our first letter in January, we ran a retail business in your town for over four years and we are lead to believe we gained some credit for our methods in handling milk. Now we wish to say that we occasionally find some people who would rather have good raw milk than the pasteurized milk. To such we will say we are in a position to furnish you what you want. We will furnish good, fresh, raw milk directly from our own herd of cows, to those who prefer this milk. We have in our employment a young man from Malin, who has recently finished his course in the O. A. C. at Corvallis, who is competent to handle, pasteurizing, butter making, cheese and ice cream making. We have installed the Babesch Tester, so we are able to ascertain the butter fat content of all milk we sell. The subject of milk, we sometimes think, that people care too little about, but if you will take the pains to inform yourself upon this matter you will find it is one of the all important foods. You should know all the circumstances surrounding the condition from which your milk comes, I will mention some of the most important.

1st. The cows from which you use your milk should be good, healthy animals; should be well fed, and kept in the most sanitary conditions possible. 2nd. Our wagon will visit all parts of the city. Soon we will inaugurate an early morning and a late afternoon delivery, so your milk will be absolutely fresh and sweet. There are many things I could say, but would make this letter too long; so come to our plant and we will try to convince you of our great effort to give to the people of your city good, clean, healthy milk, handled in the most sanitary way possible.
