

LUMBER STILL BELOW NORMAL

The Weekly Lumber Review of the West Coast Lumbermen's association reports lumber production, in the first district of Oregon and Washington, continued 42 per cent below normal for the week ending March 26th. Actual production was 49,909,935 feet.

During the week several mills which had resumed were again compelled to discontinue operation by reason of restricted markets, comparatively high costs, and sales returns which are below cost.

It becomes more and more apparent that any lumber buying of consequence for 1921 will be from east of the Mississippi river and north of the Ohio.

This forecasts intermittent West Coast operations on a production level considerably below normal, until such time as freight rate readjustments restore the competitive relationships which existed in Eastern markets prior to August 26th, last.

Eastern roads have not abandoned the idea of reducing Western lumber rates. It is reported that the Western lines have only offered the Eastern trunk lines 18 per cent of the rate division, or what Eastern lines consider to be 25 per cent of the transportation service.

Another retarding influence to readjusted Eastern rates, is the application of Southern Pine Association to Southern roads for reduction in Southern lumber rates to meet West Coast lumber rate reductions effective March 31st. It is understood the Southern roads will give their answer to the Southern manufacturers within the next two weeks.

Shipments of lumber from Pacific Northwest for the week ending March 26th totaled 56,430,319 feet, of which 59 per cent moved either by water or by auto truck.

New business for the week totaled 51,186,419 feet, of which 39 per cent was for movement by water and automobile truck.

In the rail trade, new business represented 1,197 cars; shipments 1,269 cars; unshipped balance 3,447 cars as against a normal of 13,000 cars.

In the water trade, new California and Atlantic Coast business totaled 7,661,793 feet; export orders, 4,609,000 feet.

Cargo shipments were represented in 11,152,946 feet for California and Atlantic Coast, and 2,570,223 feet export.

The unshipped balance in the domestic cargo trade was 58,739,944 feet; in the export trade 19,713,069 feet.

FERRY SERVICE IS ARRANGED

The county court has arranged for the operation of a free ferry across the lake, while the Warren Construction company is improving the road around Modoc Point grade, and will continue to operate it until the road is ready for traffic, which will be about the first of July.

This ferry will run from the foot of Barclay Springs hill on the south, to a point on the north side just below Lamm's mill, or probably to the Southern Pacific station at Harriman. The schedule, as now proposed, calls for trips every two hours. The first trip will be made from Modoc Point at 9 o'clock in the morning, and thereafter trips will be made every odd hour throughout the day. The first trip from the other side will be made at 10 o'clock in the morning, and the others on the even hour throughout the day.

The county court advises the public that the county accepts no responsibility or liability in the use of this ferry, all persons using it to do so at their own risk. The ferry, however, is in excellent condition, has a capacity of 140 tons, and can carry nine cars without crowding. A full load of cars will weigh only about 14 tons, one-tenth of the capacity, so there is no danger of overloading. The ferry is 24x60 feet.

The road will be closed tomorrow night, and the ferry will undoubtedly be in operation Friday morning. For the first three or four days it will be in charge of A. Wickstrom, but after that John Linman will take charge of it and will retain charge for the remainder of the time it is used.

FALL EXPLAINS PLAN TO UNITE LAND OFFICE

(Herald Washington Bureau) — WASHINGTON, April 6.—In response to an inquiry by Congressman Sinnott as to whether all land offices are to be consolidated, Secretary Fall has replied.

"Relative to the proposed bill authorizing the president in his discretion to consolidate the offices of register and receiver in United States land offices, I have to advise you that the report of the general land office for last year shows that out of ninety-four local land offices, forty-five were below the maximum; that is their receipts were not sufficient to pay the register and receiver each \$3000 this year.

"The receipts in these forty-five offices ranged from \$300 to \$5900

during that year. The other offices with larger land areas and bigger receipts paid larger amounts, and presumably there was more work to be done there.

"It is my thought to obtain this discretionary authority for the president to the end that he may first consolidate the offices of register and receiver in those districts where the receipts are so small as to afford an inadequate compensation for its officers and where it follows that the work is not of sufficient volume to require the service of both register and receiver. As other offices fall below the maximum in receipts and work, the offices could be consolidated there.

"The authority in the bill would, however, be broad enough to give the president power to consolidate the two offices in every land district if he found it to be advisable in the interest of economy and good administration."
