

MANY CHANGES IN NEW FISH, GAME RULINGS

The new fish and game laws have changed the daily limit on trout from 50 pounds to 30 fish, or 20 pounds and one fish daily, and established a weekly limit. Anglers should familiarize themselves with the new regulations in their entirety. Some of the provisions are discussed below.

Under the sub-heading "Open Season on Game Fish—Number—Quantity" is found the following:

"Game District No. 2—Trout, open season from April 15th to November 30th. Bag limit, 30 fish or 20 pounds and one fish in any one day, and 60 fish or 40 pounds and one fish in any seven consecutive days; provided, however, that it shall be unlawful to have in possession more than 60 fish or 40 pounds and one fish at any one time."

The local Sportsmen's Association of this city will endeavor to have the open season for this locality changed from November 30 to February 1st, thus giving local fishermen the benefit of the winter fishing. From February 1st to April 15th will protect the spring run of spawn fish, and the local sportsmen think that that would cover the object aimed at in the closed season.

Under the sub-heading "Night Hunting and Fishing Prohibited" are found the following paragraphs:

"No person shall within the state of Oregon at any time between sunset and one-half hour before sunrise hunt or catch any of the game birds or game animals of the state."

"No person shall within the state of Oregon between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise angle for or catch with hook and line, commonly called angling, any of the fish of the state."

"It shall be prima facie evidence of a violation of this act if any person, between such hours, with a gun lies in wait upon or near the runways or trails used by game animals, or flyways or in any blind near any pond or other body of water which waterfowl are accustomed to use, or with fish rod, lines or tackle used for catching fish, on any of the streams or waters of the state inhabited by fish."

Another very important matter which is receiving strict attention is the screening of ditches, and this is covered by Section 61, as follows:

"Any person owning in whole, or in part, or leasing, operating or having in charge, any irrigating ditch, or canal, millrace or other artificial watercourse, taking or receiving its waters from any river, creek or lake in which fish have been placed or may exist, shall, upon order of the state game commission, place or cause to be placed, and shall maintain, to the satisfaction of the state game commission, over the inlet of such ditch, canal, millrace or watercourse, a grating, screen or other device, either stationary or operated mechanically, of such construction, fitness, strength and quality, as shall prevent any fish from entering such ditch, canal, millrace or watercourse, to the satisfaction of the state game commission. Inadequate screening devices may be ordered removed and new screens ordered installed, when upon investigation by the state game commission or any of its representatives it is determined that any screen, grating or other device, either by construction, operation or otherwise, is found to be inadequate by the state game commission. In the event the owner in whole or in part, or person leasing, operating or having in charge such ditch, canal, millrace or other artificial watercourse, shall fail or refuse to comply with the instructions of the state game commission with respect to the installation, maintenance or repair of such screen, grating or other device within such reasonable time as may be specified by the state game commission, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and said state game commission or any of its representatives shall have the power to forthwith close the headgates or place such other barrier or obstruction in such ditch, canal, millrace or other artificial watercourse as said state game commission may deem necessary to prevent the flow of water through such ditch, canal, millrace or other artificial watercourse until a screen, grating or other device shall be placed therein to the satisfaction of the state game commission."

The foregoing section is one that the state game commission expects to enforce rigidly, as the improper screening of such ditches has probably been one of the greatest destroyers of game fish. Representatives of the commission will visit all parts of the state, with instructions to see that this section is put into full force and effect.

Resume Work on Dorris Theatre

DORRIS, Cal., April 7.—Construction has been resumed by H. Long on his concrete theater building which will be leased by Messrs. Torwilliger and Patrick of Klamath Falls for the use of their local show, known as the Star Theater. Mr. Long has been in the city for the past week securing supplies. The building will be completed by June first and ready for interior decorations and equipment which will be thoroughly modern.
