

# BANKER SPREADS KLAMATH FAME

The spring business sap is beginning to run in Klamath county, according to Charles Hall of the First National bank of Klamath Falls, who is president of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, on his arrival in Portland, says the Portland Journal. Hall went by stage through Klamath Hot Springs and Ager to Hornbrook, Cal., where he took the train.

Lumber mills are beginning to operate, some on full time, and many box factories are running at capacity, said Hall. Others are running 75 per cent capacity. Farmers who still hold a good part of their last year's produce are taking their losses and putting in new crops. Business in general is waking up. More than 150,000,000 feet of overproduction in lumber from last fall has been moved and new profitable contracts are in sight.

The federal government is beginning preliminary work on the Klamath irrigation project with \$1,000,000 as a starter. This will make 150,000 acres of new land available and will fit in nicely with the state chamber's program to attract settlers from the central west. Hall asserts. The California-Oregon Power company is also starting to spend \$1,000,000 in power development on the Link river, connecting Upper Klamath and Wauna lakes.

"The last two weeks has seen the boom start and it is really surprising. The district seems to be taking a new lease on life," Hall declares. "The claim that the Klamath irrigation project will water California arid lands with Oregon water is true, but Klamath Falls controls the business of the district and the portion of California watered from Klamath lake will benefit Oregon."

## Jazz Furniture Craze In London

LONDON, March 28, (By Mail).—"Jazz" furniture, clothing and wall paper were decried by Sir Charles C. Allen in an address before the first National Furnishing Trades convention here.

"English furniture has ranked so high in the estimation of the world that one wonders how it comes that in it at this moment a disease is developing of the jazz type," he said. "Will the public buy the jazz types of clothing material we see offered for sale, and the far worse things one finds printed and in wall papers in the wholesale stores? Jazz of all kinds is like rubbish of all kinds; it is not likely to last long."

"I have recently been shown great quantities of materials of most unharmonious color and crude design," he said. "things which might suitably be exhibited in a very dark cellar rather than in the light of day or in our homes. I was assured dressmakers were buying them largely. What a home should be like to match such clothing I do not care to think."

"It makes me devoutly trust that skirts of such materials will be nothing like so long as they are today. The human form will certainly occasionally be better to look upon than these monstrosities. They are products of a dangerously decadent movement."

# NOTICE TO DELINQUENTS ON FIRST THREE UNITS OF PAVING

The attention of Delinquent Lien Debtors on the first three paving units is called to the urgency of the situation confronting the Common Council on May First, next. On that date the principal of the remaining outstanding bonds on those units, amounting to \$47,818.53, will be due and payable; and the bonds themselves will be presented for payment to the city treasurer on that date.

There is in the hands of the city treasurer applicable to that purpose \$31,185.02, the difference or \$16,633.51 represents the delinquent principal that must be met besides the accrued interest if the financial integrity of the city is to be maintained. There is no other source than the delinquent Lien Debtors from which the necessary funds can be secured to meet this liability. It is therefore imperatively necessary that the delinquent Lien Debtors awake to that fact and come forward at once with the balance due on his or her assessments in accordance with notice thereof recently received by them.

The Common Council has noted also the amount of delinquencies existing on other paving units, including the first installments on the more recent street improvements and it causes the council to hesitate in ordering new improvements petitioned for until these latter delinquencies are approximately paid up.
