ANTITUBERCULOSIS ORGANIZER COMING PORTLAND, April 18.—Approximately \$38,700 is the sum Oregon contributed for the prevention of tuberculosis in the state through the 1920 Christmas seal sale, which provides the support for the Oregon Tuberculosis Association. This amount is an increase of \$7000 over last year.

The association's 1921 program has been broadened to include more public health nurses, free clinics, educational campaigns, legislation, child welfare work and surveys. Twelve counties now have public health organizations and Mrs. Saldie Orr-Dunbar, executive secretary, has been personally directing organization work for Marion and will go to Klamath and Lake counties in May for the same purpose.
