HAMBURG, April 1 .- (By Mail) - America's enforcement of stricter quarantine regulations to prevent vermin-infested emigrants from carrying typhus into the ports of the United States has caused German shipping companies, operating from this port in connection with American lines, to use greater vigilance in the inspection and delousing of passengers.

The facilities are so good here for handling passengers and the disinfecting plants are so large and modern that German officials have found little difficulty in meeting the suggestions of American health of

The Hamburg-American which is cooperating with the United American lines, has had model emigrant halls since 1907 which are isolated in a section of the city across the Elbe. Arriving with applicants just before the show emigrants are first put in what is started on tour, but as there were not called the "unclean" section.

After the emigrants are examined and found to be healthy they are then transferred to the "clean" section. Here they are examined twice daily by physicians until they sail to make sure that they carry no disease upon the ships.
