### FINISHING THE WINTERS BLD'G.

"Modern throughout" would well classify the new Winters building at Main street, near Seventh. The first floor has been finished for some time and is now occupied by the sales and store room of the Winters jewelry store in the east half and the phonograph department on the opposite side.

The second and third floors are divided into 19 apartments and 13 office rooms. Outside windows and skylights make these rooms bright, airy and altogether desirable. The apartment suites are especially attractive and have living room, bath room and kitchenette, with built-in cabinets, seats, kitchen tables and dining table. The walls are hard wall plaster, putty on the top floor and sand finish on the second, tinted, with wood work in white.

The doors, inside finishing and cabinet work are all "made in Klamath Falls," products from the mill of the Lakeside Lumber company, and the interior finishing of the building will compare favorably with any other of its class.

All apartments have been leased, some for months, and the office rooms are either rented or options asked. Suites are equipped with electrical heating and cooking units. They are electric homes.

Carpenters and painters are now busy on the top floors with the finishing touches, and when completed, this building, partly because of its central location, but mostly on account of its modern construction, will be one of the most desirable in the city.

### U. S. STRICTLY BARS TYPHUS

HAMBURG, April 1.—(By Mail)—America's enforcement of stricter quarantine regulations to prevent vermin-infested emigrants from carrying typhus into the ports of the United States has caused German shipping companies, operating from this port in connection with American lines, to use greater vigilance in the inspection and delousing of passengers.

The facilities are so good here for handling passengers and the disinfecting plants are so large and modern that German officials have found little difficulty in meeting the suggestions of American health officers.

The Hamburg-American line, which is cooperating with the United American lines, has had model emigrant halls since 1907 which are isolated in a section of the city across the Elbe. Arriving emigrants are first put in what is called the "unclean" section.

After the emigrants are examined and found to be healthy they are then transferred to the "clean" section. Here they are examined twice daily by physicians until they sail to make sure that they carry no disease upon the ships.
