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OREGON TO GET FOREST ROADS ROM U. S. FUN

Herald Washington Bureau WASHINGTON, April 28. -- Ore gon and twelve other public land atates will have the public land form ulate for federal aid appropriations. continued under the terms of h and highway bill which Senator Town mend, chairman of the senate postoffice and post roads committee, will introduce this week after a conference with highway and highway transport officials.

It is proposed to continue federal ald appropriations of 1102,000,000 annually for a two-year period, but with drastic changes in the methel of distribution, so that there will be primary and interstate highways.

Because of the great forest lands in Oregon, it is interesting to note that provision has been made to appropriate \$5,000,000 for use in constructing forest roads during the next fiscal year and \$10,000,000 the following year.

The plan which representative automobile and farmers' organizations indorsed, provide for a federal highway commisson to supervise distribution of funds and maintenance of roads.

One of the changes in the bill calls for matching federal funde by states instead of counties as in the past This policy has, as President Harding pointed out in his message to congress, been responsible for inside Aerial Expert quate highway systems. An outstanding feature of the new bill will be the definition as to distribution which is expected to correct the abuses growing out of the indiscriminate use of federal funds.

The chief complaint of highway transportation officials was the wide gap between good roads. In certain counties the roads were unimproved and the lack of road continuity prevented use of heavy motor traffic they said.


