RESOLUTION

The City Engineer pursuant to the Resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having under date of the 10th day of April, 1921, filed plans, specifications and estimates of the cost of improving E1 Dorado street, from Esplanade to Portland street and Melrose street from Eldorado street to Pacific Terrace, including intersections; and the Common Council having taken the same under advisement and finding said plans, specifications and estimates satisfactory.

IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, That said plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of Eldorado street from Esplanade to Portland street and Melrose street from Eldorado street to Pacific Terrace, including intersections, be and the same are hereby approved.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve said portions of Eldorado street and Melrose street, in accordance with said plans, specifications and estimates; said improvement to consist of paving said portions of Eldorado street and Melrose street with bitulithic concrete, asphaltic concrete or willite. The estimated cost of the improvement of said portions of said streets by placing thereon either bitulithic concrete, asphaltic concrete or willite to be \$16,135.55, said cost including grading, rolling, curbing and cement sidewalk.
