## ANOTHER RECORD FOR STUDEBAKER

With four records already to its credit this year, a Studebaker Light Six hung up a fifth recently, when it plowed its way from Los Angeles, California, to Phoenix, Arizona in 3 hours and 16 minutes over roads that were often nothing more than deeply rutted sand trails. Details of this remarkable performance, in which the Studebaker lowered the best previous time over this route by 2 hours, 28 minutes, have just been received by Ed. Up to the time the Light Six made its run, the fastest automobile time for the 422 miles from Los Angeles to Phoenix was 15 hours 44 minutes. ## BARNES SHOW HERE MONDAY

Monday is circus day and one of the biggest shows of its kind in the world is coming to Klamath Falls.

Al. G. Barnes' big four-ring wild animal circus is scheduled to give two performances here Monday, with one of the largest array of wild animal talent ever assembled under canvas.

The show carries more lions, tigers, leopards, zebras and other species of wild animal life than any other circus of its kind in the country. The show travels in a train of 52 cars.

One of the most unique acts in the show is that of a five-ton hippopotamus which Barnes has taught to do many wonderful tricks.

Miss Martha Florine, premier of the world's wild animal mistress, enters a den with lions, tigers, leopards and panthers and compels them to do her will, with nothing more than a light whip and a smile to enforce her commands. This is the first time these natural enemies of the jungle have ever been brought together in the same arena.

Monday, there will be a two mile long parade leaving the show grounds at 10:30 a. m. Doors to the big show open at 1 and 7 p. m. Big show performances start at 2 and 8 p. m., allowing the visitors one hour to visit the mammoth menagerie, listen to a 40-piece concert band and get acquainted with the animal actors.

"The reason that we won was that I represented Klamath Falls and set an example of what the boys from old Oregon can do."

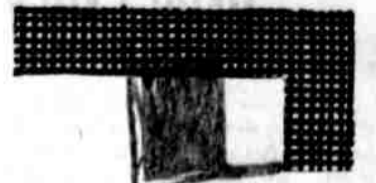
## West Coast Lumber Cut 33 Per cent Beneath Normal

The Weekly Lumber Review of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association gives lumber production, at 115 mills, in Western Washington and Western Oregon, for the week ending April 23rd, was 55,311,309 feet. Production was 33 per cent below normal. New business totaled 71,942,159 feet, of which slightly more than 50 per cent was water and local delivery. New coastwise and inter-coastal cargo business amounted to 23,623,816 feet. New export business 4,202,000 feet.

Local business, handled by team and auto truck, reached the year's high figure, at 5,914,498 feet.

Transcontinental rail orders, at 1,381 cars, showed a decrease of 300 cars from the previous week and was 300 cars below normal. Shipments totaled 63,964,882 feet, of which 29 per cent was represented in cargo clearances and local deliveries. Rail shipments totaled 1,498 cars. Domestic cargoes, 7,445,063 feet. Export cargoes, 5,665,321 feet. Unshipped balances—rail trade, 3,575 cars; domestic cargo, 86,991,367 feet; export, 22,496,745 feet.
