California News

CHICO, May 5.—Despite the inclemency of the weather, a record crowd, estimated at more than 7,000 people, journeyed to the Bell & Bennett ranch, north of Chico, Monday for the closing day of the Northern California roundup.

YREKA, May 5.—Henry Ringo, capitalist of Yreka, committed suicide Saturday in a work shop in the rear of his home.

CASTELLA, May 5.—This town sustained the loss of three homes by fire, all of the east side of the railroad, and at the upper end of the village.

LDOI, May 5.—The Lodi Women's club is to proceed immediately with the construction of its new \$28,000 clubhouse. This was decided on at the annual meeting of the directors. Of the amount needed, \$20,000 has already been subscribed.

REDDING, May 5.—The business district fire here a week ago Saturday evening, entailed a loss of \$12,456, according to the adjustments made by the insurance companies on the losses, all of which were partial.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 5.—Superior California will list another large item in her new program of industrial development when the Great Western Power company starts operations this week at its new giant Caribou power plant on the North Fork of the Feather river in Plumas county.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 5.—On motion of his attorney, the application of Thomas J. Mooney for new trial for murder of a preparedness day victim in 1916, was postponed today until May 23d. The attorney said delay was asked to enable witnesses to arrive from the East.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 5.—Many government steamers have been chartered during the past two months for May and June loading at Northern Pacific ports of grain, flour and lumber for United Kingdom, European and Oriental ports and it is believed many will be unable to fulfill their contracts should the crews refuse to man their craft as the result of the seamen's strike order.

SIERRA CITY, May 5.—Residents of Sierra county, California, and of Reno, Nevada, met at the summit of the Yuba Pass and shoveled snow from the road. There was a new fall recently, but this will be gone in a short time.

RESOLUTION

The City Engineer pursuant to the Resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having under date of the 19th day of April, 1921, filed plans, specifications and estimates of the cost of improving El Dorado street from Esplanade to Portland street and Melrose street from El Dorado to Pacific Terrace, including intersections; and the Common Council having taken the same under advisement and finding said plans, specifications and estimates satisfactory.

IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, That said plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of El Dorado street from Esplanade to Portland street and Melrose street from El Dorado to Pacific Terrace, including intersections, be and the same are hereby approved.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve said portions of El Dorado street and Melrose street, in accordance with said plans, specifications and estimates; said improvement to consist of paving said portions of El Dorado street and Melrose street with Bitulithic, Concrete, Asphaltic Concrete or Willite. The estimated cost of the improvement of said portions of said streets by placing thereon either bitulithic, concrete, asphaltic concrete or willite to be \$16,618.55, said cost including grading, rolling, curbing and cement sidewalk.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, By the Common Council that the following described property be and is hereby declared benefited by said improvement, to-wit: Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23 in Block 26 Original Town, Lots 3 and 4 in Block 27, Original Town, Lot 2, Bk 2, West Klamath Falls Addn, Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23 in Block 4 West Klamath Falls, addition to the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon; and that certain acreage property in Lot 2, Section 22, Township 38 South, Range 9 East, Willamette Meridian, lying southerly of Lot 23 in Block 4 West Klamath Falls Addition and that part of Lot 11, Section 32 lying southerly of Lot 23, Block 3 West Klamath Falls Addition to the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, and extending to the City Limits; and that said property above listed and described be and hereby is declared to be assessed for the expense of said improvement.
