"In the old days when we had had dreams about three alarm fires, it was comforting to hear the horses munching and champing in the stalls below us. It soothed us. Now we can dream on until we kick all the bed-clothes off. There's no stamping of the trusty hoofs to wake us up or the good old nicker to tell us to go back to sleep again."

"Believe me, it's lonesome in these big firehouses at night without the old boys. I wish they were back. Did you ever see a policeman's horse follow him around like a dog? Well, take that policeman's horse away from him and he's lost, that's all. It's the same way with a fireman."
