

D. A. R. AGENTS OF PATRIOTISM

WASHINGTON, May 6.—"As an effective agency for the perpetuation and development of a spirit of true patriotism, the Society of Daughters of the American Revolution is unsurpassed," declares the Republican Publicity Association, through its president, Hon. Jonathan Bourne, Jr. "In that organization will be found much of the purest of American blood flowing through hearts that are justly thrilled by pride over ancestral achievements. Not only in the annual conventions of the National organization but in all the frequent meetings of local chapters, are revived and repeated the countless stories of individual valor, suffering and self sacrifice by means of which a small band of patriots met successfully the assaults of well trained armies of a despotic sovereign, aided by large numbers of colonialists who for various reasons remained loyal to the crown. The D. A. R. is the most active gatherer of new historical data covering the revolutionary period and is doing a valuable work which would otherwise be left undone. In its halls the daughters of the Union and of the Confederacy meet on a common level, all working to promote the welfare of their common country.

"Other patriotic organizations, among them the American Legion, are rendering important service in preaching the doctrines of unadulterated Americanism. Quite likely, for a time, the attention of organizations of veterans of the World War will be centered upon subjects of peculiar interest to themselves, but as time removes these special subjects from constant attention a larger field will be found for their activity in conducting patriotic work along lines of Americanization so much needed in our conglomerate citizenship. All these organizations have a highly useful work to perform and they deserve the encouragement and help of all good citizens.

"It has been fortunate that in the selection of officials who direct the policies and control the management of the leading patriotic societies the members have chosen men and women sound in judgment and deliberate in action, as well as patriotic in purpose. There are always sinister interests which are ready, for partisan or selfish reasons, to make surreptitious use of large organizations such as these. Persons inspired by motives of that kind usually do not work in the open but accomplish their ends by secret creation of prejudice. Undoubtedly efforts of this nature were made in recent political campaigns but it is to the credit of all the well-established patriotic societies that none of them fell victim to the wiles of designing politicians. In the tense nervous strain of the after-war period it is easy to stir up antagonism by merely pointing the accusing finger and whispering 'pro-German' or 'pro-British' or 'pro-anything-else. As a medium for conducting such an attack, a patriotic society would be a most potent agency and one susceptible of great wrong if improperly used. The Daughters of the American Revolution, the brother organization of similar name, the American Legion and other world war fraternalities may well congratulate themselves and their officers that they have been kept free from the injury that would follow injudicious action under the instigation of selfish or partisan interest."

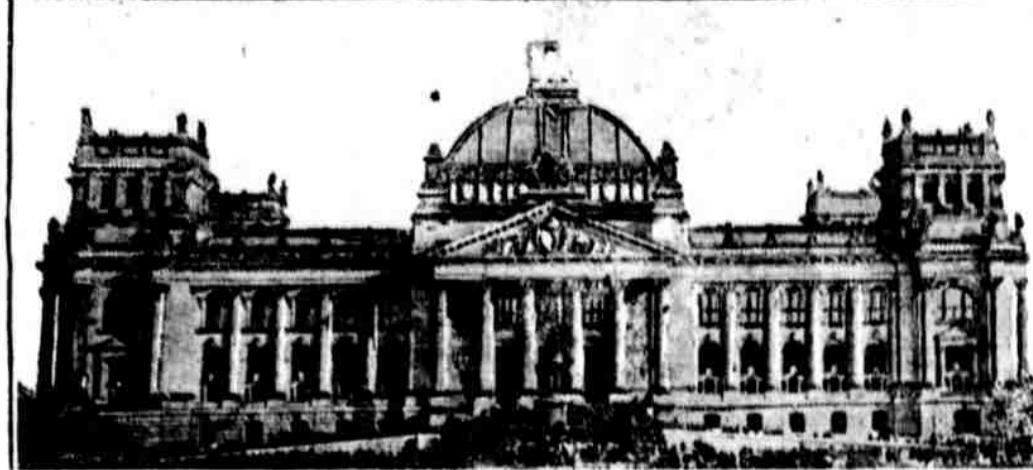

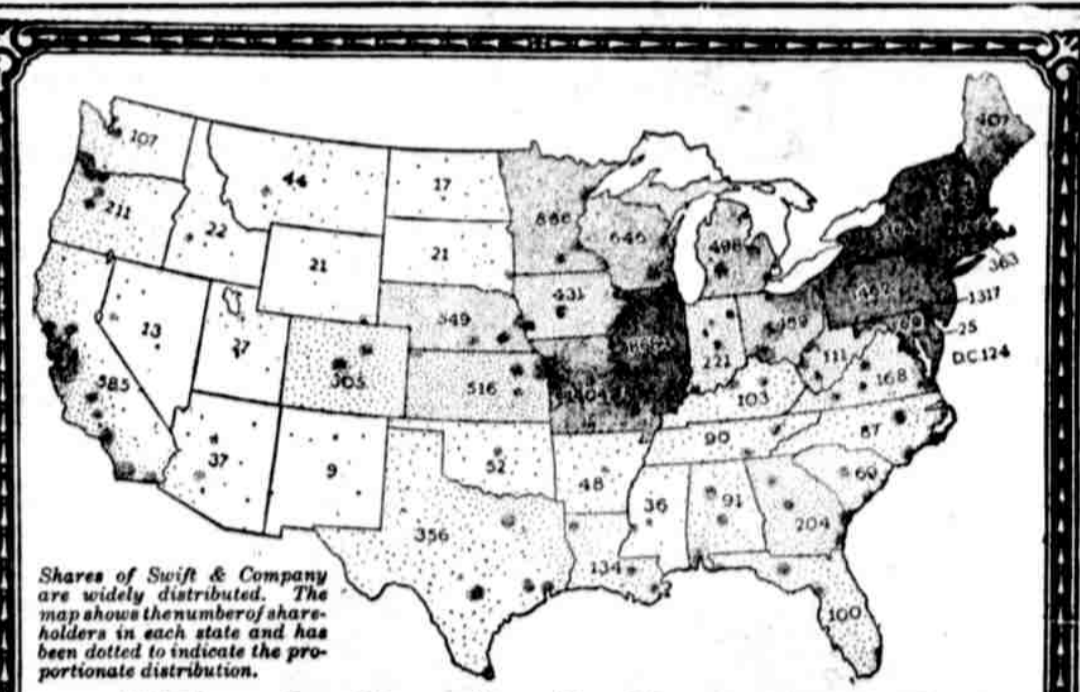
