RESOLUTION
The City Council pursuant to the Resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having under date of the Second day of April, 1921, filed plans, specifications and estimates of the cost of improving South Riverside street from West Main street to the City Limits and West Main street from end of pavement at Conger avenue to the westerly line of South Riverside street, including intersections; and the Common Council having taken same under advisement and finding said plans, specifications and estimates satisfactory.

IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, That said plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of South Riverside street, from West Main street to the City Limits and West Main street from end of pavement at Conger avenue to the westerly line of South Riverside street, including intersections, be and the same are hereby approved;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve said portions of South Riverside and West Main street, in accordance with said plans, specifications and estimates; said improvement to consist of paving said portions of said streets with Concrete, Willite or Bitulithite. The estimated cost of the improvement of said portions of said streets by placing thereon either Concrete, Willite or Bitulithite to be \$37,618.10, said cost including grading, rolling, curbing and cement sidewalk.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, By the Common Council that the following described property be and it is hereby declared benefitted by said improvement, to-wit:

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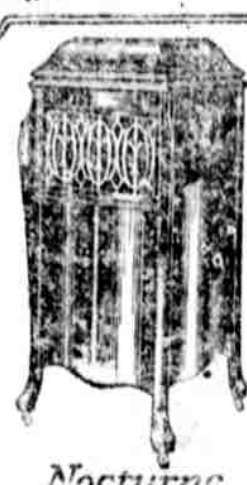
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
