THE LIBERTY

RESOLUTION

The City Engineer pursuant to the

heretofore adopted, having under
date of the 1st day of April, 1921,
filed plans, specifications and esti-
mates of the cost of improving High
street from Third street to the west-
erly line of Cedar street and Cedar
street from High street to Pine street,
including intersections; and the
Common Council having taken the
same under advisement and find-
ing said plans, specifications and es-
timates satisfactory.

IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, That
said plans, specifications and esti-
mates for the improvement of High
street from Third street to the west-
erly line of Cedar street and Cedar
street from High street to Pine street,
including intersections, be and the
same are hereby approved.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLV-
ED, That the Common Council hereby
declares its intention to improve
said portions of High street and Cedar
street in accordance with said
plans, specifications and estimates;
said improvement to consist of pav-
ing said portions of High street and
Cedar street with Bitulithic, Con-
crete or Willite. The estimated cost
of the improvement of said portions
of said street by placing thereon either
Bitulithic, Concrete or Willite to be
\$20,125.10, said cost including
grading, rolling, curbing and cement
sidewalk.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLV-
ED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL,
That the following described prop-
erty be and is hereby declared benefi-
tary by said improvement, to-wit: Lots
1, 2, 3, 4, 5 Block 6 Ewauna Heights,
Lots 5, 6, 7, 8 Block 6, Original
Town, Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 Block
5, Ewauna Heights, Lots 6, 7, 8,
Block 4 Original Town, Lots 1, 2, 3,
Block 4 Ewauna Heights, Lots 3 and
4 Block 3, Original Town, Lots 1 and
2 Block 3, Ewauna Heights, Lots 4,
5, 6, Block 2 Original Town, Lots 1,
2, 3, Block 1, Ewauna Heights, Lots
