S. Jeffries, secretary-manager of the local association.

To entertain the delegates to the convention, which is regarded in business and financial circles as second only in importance to the annual conventions of the National Foreign

Trade Council, the local association recently increased its membership to 1,000 and is planning to add 250 additional members so that every credit man in northern California will be in a position to assist the San

Francisco organization in acting as host to the visiting delegates.
