SAN FRANCISCO, May 13.—The Railroad Commission has not yet been called upon to supply false teeth or to make stinging hens lay eggs, according to Ed. T. McGettigan, recorder of the commission. Nevertheless, he said, there is no telling what the future will bring forth, considering the unexpected sequel to the commission's recent exposure of a landlord's attempt to raise apartment rents on the strength of gas and electricity rate increases which had not taken place.

An excited individual rushed into his office with the complaint, "The landlord he raise my brother's rent. What are you going to do about it? First it was \$20. That's all right. Then he raise it to \$22.50. That's going pretty strong. Next it was \$25. That's real bad, but now the landlord say \$30. I come to the commission."

Shepherd Finds Mammoth Skelton

ARLINGTON, Ore., May 13.—William Marshall, a sheep herder, discovered the skeleton of a prehistoric mammal the other day when he kicked over a "stake" in the sage brush in Butcher Knife canyon, about four miles east of Arlington, Gilliam county, near the mouth of Willow Creek, while watching his flock feeding on the hills.

Parts of skeletons of prehistoric animals have been seen often in past years in canyons in eastern Oregon. The tusk Marshall discovered measured nine feet from the base, which is 12 inches in diameter, to the tip. The inside or narrow part of the tusk crumbles easily to the touch, but the outside is in perfect state of preservation, and in some spots the outside enamel can be seen. It has a blue black color. A surface excavation disclosed an intact skeleton, including the head, vertebrae and ribs. Arlington citizens are

planning to have the specimens exhumed and mounted for exhibition purposes.
