American Spelling Taboo In England

MELROUNE, May 17.—American forms of spelling have been barred from official documents in the High Court. The Federal Chief Justice has announced that he will not allow their introduction and ordered the spelling of the words "program" and "center" changed to "programme" and "centre." He remarked that English spelling was good enough for him.

Los Angeles Will Stop Stock Car Contests

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 17.—Motor speed contests over public highways, for the purpose of advertising stock automobiles, must stop in Los Angeles county, Thomas Lee Woolwine, district attorney, has announced.

He said he was not opposed to legitimate sports, but declared such uses of stock cars could not be construed as a sport. Furthermore, he added, officials of the state motor vehicle department had declared such contests dangerous to the public, as the cars were run at excessive speed.

Mr. Woolwine said persons who continued the practice would be prosecuted under the state motor vehicle law, and he instructed his chief deputy, W. C. Doran, to present the matter to the county grand jury, with special reference to two recent exploitation runs.
