

MOVIE ACTORS HELP INDIGENT

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 17.—Actors, writers, producers, sportsmen and civic officials are cooperating here with Daniel Frohman, theatrical magnate, in plans for a huge outdoor benefit festival June 4 at the Los Angeles Speedway to raise funds for indigent and disabled actors throughout the country.

The affair is scheduled to consist of a rodeo, fashion show, bathing girl review, theatrical performance and athletic carnival.

Daniel Frohman, who will supervise the performance, is in California visiting after an absence of some time. His last "work day visit," he says, was fifteen years ago and, before then, forty years ago.

Then, he told members of the profession here recently, he was "harnstorming," and making \$35 a week. Mr. Frohman, who is now in his sixties, and one of the best known theatrical men in America and on the continent, is president of the Actors' Fund of America in the name of which organization the benefit is being undertaken.

Citizens Urged to Go to Crater Lake

The following is from the Medford Mail Tribune:

There is an acute situation confronting the people of Oregon as regards their patronage of Crater Lake this year. The new Crater Lake company has taken an option of purchase from A. L. Parkhurst of his concession and unless this season is a profitable one for the investors they will not make the purchase next March.

Should Crater Lake show a profit this year, it is the intention of the new company to expend \$100,000 in permanent improvements. If this is done, then the government will be called upon to spend a similar amount on additional roads and trails as well as improving the present roads, therefore, it is up to each individual of this state who has never visited Crater Lake National Park to do so this year and thereby giving his aid to make Crater Lake National Park of as great importance as are the other national parks in the west.

WHEREAS, it is deemed expedient to change the present grade at the intersection of Seventh Street and Walnut Avenue from elevation 146 to elevation 148.

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Common Council hereby declares its intention to change the grade at the intersection of Seventh Street and Walnut Avenue from elevation 146 to elevation 148.

The estimated cost of the improvement of said portions of said streets, including intersections, by placing thereon either Concrete, Bitulithic or Willite, or other hard surface pavement to be \$211,703.55, said cost including grading, rolling, curbing and cement sidewalk.
