**CALIFORNIA NEWS**

**DORRIS, May 21.**—The Taft Lumber company has commenced operations with a small crew at its mill near the Klamath river.

**WEED, May 21.**—The Weed Lumber company's saw mill started operation recently with a full crew. The mill will only be run by the day shift for the present, but a night shift will be put on as soon as the company can get the men, probably the latter part of next week.

**PLACERVILLE, California, May 21.**—Considerable damage was done the fruit in the higher fruit belts of El Dorado county by a heavy hailstorm which accompanied a cloud burst. Three inches of hail fell at some points. An inch of rain fell here in about an hour.

**SACRAMENTO, May 21.**—What was described as the greatest forward movement in the livestock industry in California was inaugurated here when growers of cattle, sheep, goats and hogs met with Director G. H. Hecke of the State Department of Agriculture and formulated plans for the first annual convention of California livestock growers.

**SAN FRANCISCO, May 21.**—Stocks in storage by the oil companies in California increased 1,142,147 barrels in April, according to figures made public by the Standard Oil companies, amounting to \$78,981 barrels a day, showed an increase of 1289 barrels a day over March. April shipments were 300,577 barrels, an advance of 5451 barrels daily over March. The April production set a new record for California.

**Sticks** are made of a stem of bamboo rolled in a preparation containing many different odoriferous drugs, two of which are acoulate and camphor. The acoulate serves to protect the sticks against the attacks of rats and mice and the camphor causes them to burn steadily.
