George T. Collins is over from Medford for a few days.

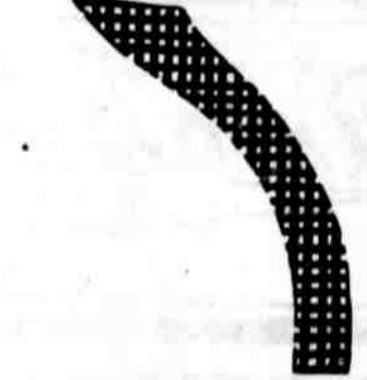
E. W. Gowen is down from Chiloquin attending the Western Nights.

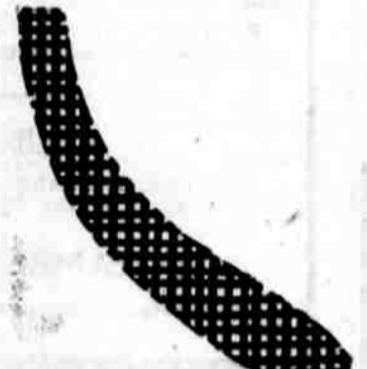
