CHAUTAUQUA TO START TUESDAY

Everything will be in readiness for the opening of the Chautauqua tomorrow afternoon. At the last moment it was decided not to use the old tabernacle building. The tent will be placed on the vacant lot at Seventh and High streets.

In order to permit the teachers and children to attend the Chautauqua, it has been decided to advance the time for opening the schools in the mornings from nine to eight o'clock for grades one, two and three.
