

RECENT EVENTS AT STATE CAPITAL

SALEM, Or., May 26.—(Special)—Bids for road-building work aggregating an estimated cost of \$1,200,000 will be opened by the state highway commission at its meeting in Portland May 27. An effort will be made to complete the work this year. The projects follow:

Clackamas county—Pacific highway, Aurora-Canby section, 2.75 miles paving. Mount Hood loop. Multnomah county line to forest boundary section, three units, 22.8 miles grading. Coos county—Rosevelt highway, North Bend and Coquille section, 6 mile concrete pavement. Coos and Douglas counties—Roseburg-Coos Bay highway, Remote-Camas valley section, 1.4 miles rock surfacing. Douglas county—Pacific highway, Oakland-South section, 1.16 miles paving. Gilliam county—John Day river highway, Condon-north section, 6 miles grading and rock surfacing. Jackson county—Crater Lake highway, Agate-Trail section, 14.35 miles rock or gravel surfacing. Tillamook county—McMinnville-Tillamook highway, Dolph to Hebo, crushed rock maintenance surfacing. Union county—LaGrande-Enterprise highway, Walowa-Hill section, 5.48 miles grading. Yamhill county—McMinnville-Tillamook highway, Sheridan-Willamina section, 4.1 miles grading and paving. Sour Grass section, 6.8 miles grading and surfacing.

The public service commission has ordered the California Oregon Power company to turn on its current for pumping water on the Grants Pass irrigation district, pending an investigation by the commission relative to rates. The complaint to the commission said that the company had refused to turn on the current because of difficulty over a contract, and crops were suffering as a result.

O. P. Hoff, state treasurer, announces that on June 1 his office will open bids on \$121,275 irrigation drainage district bonds to cover state guarantee of interest on bonds of the Talent, Grants Pass, Warm Springs and Ochoee irrigation districts.

The state irrigation securities commission certified \$7000 bonds for the Kingman Colony drainage district near Nyssa.

The total number of motor vehicles registered in the state from January 1 to April 30 was 95,580, according to a statement by the secretary of state, and in addition there was listed the registration of 2171 motorcycles, 468 dealers, 2428 chauffeurs and 16,178 operators. The total amount of fees collected was \$1,992,549. During April 3750 motor vehicles were registered, and the amount received in fees was \$136,797. Added to this figure the registration of motorcycles, chauffeurs, dealers and operators and the recording of additional sets of license plates, transfers and duplicates, brought the fees for April up to \$143,490.25.

Representatives of the Portland Association of Heating and Piping Contractors and of the Oregon Electrical Contractors and Dealers appeared before the state board of control with a plan that the state, in its building program, deal directly with the contractors instead of continuing the policy of allowing general building contractors to sublet contracts for plumbing, heating, electrical wiring, etc. The board has indicated that it is "inclined" to the general contractors and that they will not act in a separate deal, largely for the reason that the public service commission has the plan under consideration.

Details with the board of control is being made in its line of work in Oregon schools is expressed by D. H. Phillips, a representative of the board of educational control, who said in a statement that the board of control will be held in session on May 27.

Oregon's total tax for this year is an increase of more than 20 per cent over last year, according to records in the office of the state tax commission. The total tax for this year is \$41,117,367.71, and the total for last year was \$32,590,695.03, a difference of \$8,526,672.68.

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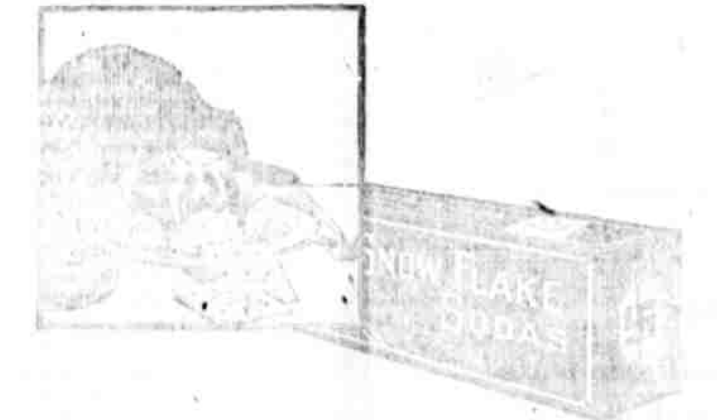
