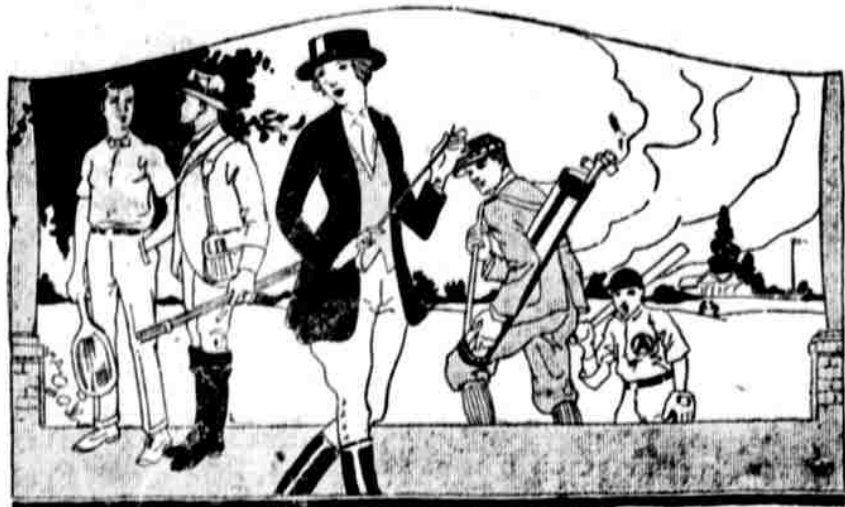

OREGON ALERT AGAINST FIRES

Forest Protection Week Results in Nation-Wide Effort to Save Trees.

Telegram Washington Bureau WASHINGTON, May 27.—Governor Olcott of Oregon is one of seven chief executives of states to cooperate in making forest protection week, which started Sunday, a great success. The governors of Minnesota, New York, North Dakota, Pennsylvania, Texas and Montana, each prepared special statements urging general observance of forest protection week.

Fourteen states in all issued proclamations to prevent fires throughout the year, not only in the forests, but everywhere.

No previous effort inaugurated by the forest service has received such prompt and cheerful support from every department of business.

Many Aid Plan
The Chamber of Commerce of the United States, the International Kiwanis clubs, the American Automobile association, National Board of Fire Underwriters, International association of Rotary clubs, National Fire Protection association, the General Federation of Women's clubs in virtually every state in the Union, the Daughters of the American Revolution, all have sent out letters, or specially prepared circulars, drawing attention to the special purpose of the week.

The American Automobile association sent copies of the letter issued by the secretary of agriculture to every club in the country. State foresters in many states have started one form or another of publicity to induce talk and create continued interest in the one big subject of the week.

Scouts Join Work
The Boy Scouts of America, considered by the forest service to be one of its most efficient allies in preventing forest fires, issued a special forest protection number of work producing trees. The crux of

for May, and Forester W. B. Greeb the monthly publication "Scouting," by, and Chief Scout Executive James E. West of New York, sent 10,500 letters to scout masters and scout executives everywhere in America.

The postoffice department is running thirty-two fire prevention cancellation dies in the principal post-offices throughout the nation so that every letter sent from those offices will carry the message to the recipients.

In six western districts of the forest service with headquarters at Denver, Colo., Albuquerque, N. M., Odgen, Utah; Missoula, Mont; Portland, Or; and San Francisco, Cal., officers of the service are conducting publicity campaigns, and 2000 rangers throughout these states are putting forth every effort to make the people think about little else, for a week, at least, except how to keep down losses from fire.

Situations Held Grave
The forest service says: "Three-fifths of the original timber supply in the United States is gone. There is now consumed annually more than 51,000,000,000 board feet of material of saw timber size, and nearly 5,000,000,000 feet is destroyed by fire, insects or other agencies.

"Our depleted forests are growing less than one-quarter of this total amount. Not only are the remaining virgin forests being cut heavily, but we are using up the second growth and small material on which depends our future supply. In all, the requirements of our population are close to 300 board feet per capita.

"The answer to the forestry problem is not to use less wood, but to grow more—to put our idle acres to work producing trees. The crux of the problem lies in preventing forest fires."
